

Congratulations to Honourary Membership Recipients for 2016



After Kay's graduation in 1955, she worked at St. Joe's in many areas including 20 years as Head Nurse in the Emergency Department. She loved her staff, and turn, her staff loved her.

"When I graduated in 1968 and went to work in ER at St. Joe's, Kay McPhee was my first Head Nurse. I was one of many who Kay kindly put under her wing and freely taught us all the finer points of how to become and how to behave as a caring ER nurse. I became Kay's protégé and it all happened as easy as breathing. I believe that through Kay's constant guidance and encouragement many professional opportunities opened up for me in distant and exotic countries, ones that I could never have achieved on my own. Kay was among the founding members of the Emergency Nurses Association of Ontario where she served as the first president. She was awarded the Queen Elizabeth's medal, the Silver Jubilee, in honour of outstanding service to others. She was known as a knowledgeable and compassionate nurse and later finished her career as the Director of Nurses at Idlewyld Manor. Kay was Vice President, President and Past President of St. Joseph's School of Nursing Alumnae Association from 2000-2006 inclusive.

As President of the Alumnae Association she was instrumental in updating our Alumnae Constitution. After her presidency, Kay remained active lending her talents to our Reunion Day Events. She would help with the 50/50 draw along with her dear friend Connie Siganski Owen '55 who recently died in October 2015.

On behalf of the Executive and the entire Alumnae Association, I would like to extend our sincere condolences to Kay's family, friends and her classmates. A great light has been extinguished from our midst.





Toast to the Alma Mater by Pat Faulkner Duxbury '66

It is my pleasure to give the toast to St. Joseph's School of Nursing on behalf of the 50 year Class of 1966.

The setting today is very different than when we graduated and were welcomed into this Alumnae Association with a very proper Mother-daughter tea. We wore hats, dresses, nylons and ate delicate sandwiches while alumnae members, wearing gloves, poured tea from a silver tea service. After graduation, we were invited yearly to the Chrysanthemum Ball, the formal Alumnae Association dance.

We all share wonderful memories of our days as student nurses and we thank our Alumnae Association for providing the means to allow us to reconnect with friends and witness the ongoing success of our alumnae members.

50 years ago my class were seniors and now we are seniors again! When we came into nursing, our adolescence was definitely challenged. We were to live, study and work with complete strangers but these strangers quickly became our family. We learned to share so much, whether it be uniforms, study notes or a ready supply of blind dates. We worked hard to diligently practice new skills such as injection technique, creatively injecting oranges with vodka and piercing each other's ears!

Living in residence, rules were strict: 10:00 pm curfews, the need to sign in and out every time one left the building, as well as late night impromptu meetings in a classroom with the Director of Nursing to deal with problems in residence. Everything from the fear and anxiety being caused by playing with the Ouija board to who replaced the sugar bowls with salt in the Nursing Office staff kitchen, that we shared while living in Undermount.

Through all of this, we grew together and learned that a job can only be accomplished well with the full support of our family or the community in which we work. But raising a family requires exceptional teachers and these were in abundance. Looking around the room today, I see many of the classroom and clinical teachers and staff nurses who inspired us and prepared us for going out into the world and living the overwhelming "life of experience."

Thank you for teaching us 3 wonderful lessons: maturity, responsibility and team work. Together, arm in arm, we have worked to make a difference for the health of all people, whether it be in the clinical settings of the hospital, the local community, the classroom, in service to the poor of the world or in the board room helping shape policy.

On behalf of all of the graduates of St. Joseph's School of Nursing, we honour the dedication and commitment of the Sisters of St. Joseph and the many, many graduates who have worked tirelessly on behalf of our alma mater.


