

St. Joe's Grads Making a Difference

Janet Dawson Kasperski '65 R.N., MHSc, CHE

Upon graduation from Cathedral Girls High School, in Hamilton, Jan entered St Joseph's School of Nursing in Hamilton to become one of the 110 graduates of 1965. "Do unto others as we would have them do unto us"...was the core value that underpinned the rest of her career. It held a deep appreciation for how privileged we were to be able to serve in our healthcare system.

Jan started her career in Emergency at St. Joseph's in Hamilton, where her passion for children in need was born. She also thrived in de-escalating situations in psychiatric crisis, the trauma and cardiac arrest rooms and addressing the emotional distress of caring for complex needs of patients and their distraught families. She also learned that humour at times was a great substitute for tears and emotional distress.



Janet Dawson Kasperski'65

After working for one year, Jan married Sam, an incredible Einstein-brilliant, gentle man, who was by her side for over 53 years. Together they raised three children while Jan worked as a home care nurse, a public health nurse, an occupational health nurse and a psychiatric nurse before returning to emergency nursing. During this period, Jan began an undergrad degree in Psychology at McMaster University and became a Research Associate at McMaster in Psychiatry/Gastroenterology. She also functioned as a Research Associate in the Department of Anaesthesiology while completing her degree.

Jan applied to the first class of the Masters of Health Sciences program at McMaster and was one of 16 chosen from 650 applicants. Jan was awarded the "Jeanne Mance Scholarship Award" which is awarded to previous graduates from Mohawk College's Nursing program and includes nurses who previously graduated from St. Joseph's School of Nursing and the Hamilton General Hospital's School of Nursing. Jan's clinical placement was in the Department of Psychiatry and she had an opportunity to be on the ground floor in development of Behaviour Medicine. She completed her thesis on Eating Disorders with the support of researchers from the Clarke Institute of Psychiatry. She then became a Clinical Nurse Specialist in Emergency at the Hospital for Sick Children, where she helped with the development of Orientation for Residents and Nurses, the Paediatric Advance Life Program, The Poison Control Centre, The Information Call Line and conducted research on Primary Nursing. Jan then returned to St Joe's as Manager of ER where she also became involved with the design of the new ER and Urgent Care Centre in East Hamilton.

Jan was appointed Director of Emergency and Ambulatory Care at Toronto General Hospital and then promoted to the role of Assistant Vice-President of the Surgical Program and the Administrative Director of the Neurosciences Collaborative Grouping as the Toronto General Hospital and the Toronto Western Hospital merged to become The Toronto Hospital, now known as the University Health Network. Jan then became Senior Vice-President at Hotel-Dieu Hospital in St. Catharines. The role of Jeanne Mance, Canada's first lay nurse, became much more visible and meaningful.

Jan further developed administrative skills in regional planning, governance skills on the Board of a Registered Charity and as a Board Member of an Aging in Place Seniors complex. She participated in policy development at the provincial level and developed skills as the hospital's media and government relations officer.

After turning down several CEO positions, she joined a weekend retreat with the executive committee of the Ontario College of Family Physicians (OCFP) and helped plan a model for the healthcare system anchored in a model that is aligned with today's inter-professional and inter-organizational Ontario Health Teams, The Northern School of Medicine, Smart EMR/EHRs, alternate payment plans to replace "fee-for-service", distributing learning in community hospitals and a focus on population health rather than treating after the fact. She spent 15 years transforming this vision (The Prescription for Excellent Healthcare) into action. In addition, Jan was heavily involved in healthy child development, palliative care, mental health and addictions and an innovative continuing professional development approach anchored in coaching and mentoring models that became The Centre for CPD Excellence. She was especially honoured to work with The Chiefs of the First Nations' Health Council and to travel all over the province celebrating family medicine in Ontario and became a faculty member of the Northern School of Medicine.

Jan thought she retired in 2018 but accepted a position with the OPA (Ontario Psychological Association) and spent time at Queen's Park with 14 different Ministries and multiple organizations on a variety of issues , like the root causes of homelessness, the poverty strategy, mental and substance abuse in the justice system, sexual assaults, domestic violence and child custody issues to name a few. After a second retirement and the loss of her husband Sam, Jan found that her grieving process was nothing like what the strategy espoused it to be. She begged St. Joe's CEO to find a way to bring her back into the fold and became a member of St. Joe's Patient and Family Council. The long ago memory of a baby in the paediatric unit, who left with loving parents and later became a family physician, evoked a need to re-engage in the child development arena. Jan is now the proud Founder, President and CEO of Resilient Kids Canada, a role she hopes to still be in until her 100th birthday!!

St. Joe's Grads Making a Difference

Tom Dignan '72

Tom was a member of the Mohawk from Six Nations of the Grand River. He served as a pioneer in health of Aboriginal people for more than 30 years. He grew up in Hamilton's working class, rough and tumble east side. He was diagnosed with dyslexia. But his ambition, energy and interests led him to nursing.

Tom left high school at the age of 16 after the sudden death of his father and worked as an office boy and stockroom clerk to support his mother and sisters.

At age 18, he entered the U. S. Marine Corps and during his service, he earned his high school equivalency. After his discharge, and a six-year stint in computer operations, he enrolled in St. Joseph's School of Nursing. Tom graduated from St. Joseph's School of Nursing in 1972 and joined the Adolescent Unit at the Hamilton Psychiatric Hospital, and later worked at the Outpost Nursing Station in Berens River Manitoba.

In 1974 he enrolled at the University of Alberta for his BScN, working summers at outpost stations in northern Manitoba. With his degree he returned to Hamilton and served as a Clinical Nursing Instructor at Mohawk College for two years. He was also involved in the newly developed Mohawk College Paramedic Training Program. He was the Inaugural President of the Canadian Indigenous Nursing Association.

He entered the Faculty of Medicine at McMaster University and in 1981 became its oldest graduate and first ever graduate of First Nations ancestry, fulfilling a childhood dream of becoming a doctor!

He became the "first emergency educated physician" in Thunder Bay after completing a mixed internship of 3 years of family medicine, 1 year of emergency medicine and trauma surgery and 1 year of anesthesia. He also became a licensed pilot who flew to isolated First Nations in Northern Ontario as he looked after remote Indigenous communities. He became a tireless advocate for eradicating disparities in healthcare outcomes and inequities in the quality of healthcare facing Indigenous people. He had a particular interest in the debilitating effects of institutionalized racism and oppression.

Tom was awarded several honours during his career! He received the Queen's Jubilee Medal in 2002. He received the National Aboriginal Achievement Award in March of 2005 for Medicine and Mentorship of many Indigenous medical students. The Order of Ontario followed in 2006 and in 2012 he received the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal from the Ontario government. He also worked with Health Care Canada as a Medical Officer with the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch.

Dr Tom was also an enthusiastic member of the Board of Governors at the First Nations University. In 2019 he was named a member of the Order of Canada.

Dr Tom was described as compassionate, inspiring, fiery and courageous, outspoken and bold in every aspect of his life!

Tom unfortunately passed away January 17, 2021. He was 79. Tom was married to Cheryl and was father to two children and grandfather to two grandchildren.



Your executive sadly says farewell to 3 of our team as our new fiscal year begins. The following are highlights of their many contributions that have kept our Alumnae going for so long.

Janina Muta Berenyi '65 (written by Connie Prowse '69)

Janina joined the Executive in 1995 as the Recording Secretary. She continued in this position until 2004.

In 1998, an article was written by Janina regarding the restructuring at St. Joseph's Hospital and was published in the newsletter.

June 4, 2004 was the birth of the Alumnae website <u>www.sjsnaa.com</u> The history of St. Joseph's School of Nursing and the Alumnae was written by Janina on the website.

Janina took on the position of Archive Coordinator in 2004 and remained in this position until 2022.

Friday June 3, 2005

Reunion Day Celebrations included the unveiling of the showcase displaying our uniforms and historical archives in the front lobby of St Joseph's Hospital. A ribbon cutting ceremony by Sister Joan O'Sullivan '43, and Janina brought tears to many an eye. A luncheon was served at the hospital. The alumnae was given a climate controlled area in the hospital library. All the archival pictures, albums, pins, rings, exams from the 1930's and other treasures are housed there. Original period student uniforms have been washed, starched, and assembled for our display cabinet. Janina was involved in rescuing archival items from various areas including the Villa, executive members homes, etc. Items have been photographed, catalogued and preserved in the storage room.

Janina produced many powerpoint presentations for our annual Reunion Day Celebrations, using our yearbooks, pamphlets, and historical material. She has arranged displays of large composite graduation photos as well as memorabilia from our archives. She has also spent time being the Reunion Day Photographer and operating the video equipment. During this time she was also the Raffle and Door Prize Coordinator for Reunion Day Celebrations. Prizes were used as a fundraiser for the Alumnae. She worked with Beverly Shynal Greenwood'70 purchasing gifts, wrapping them and setting up the display tables. You may remember Janina selling raffle tickets!



In 2011, our Alumnae celebrated 100 years for St Joseph's School of Nursing. Janina contributed pictures and information for an archival calendar. She presented an archival powerpoint at Nursing Grand Rounds. She also organized an "Artist Corner" of handmade articles for Reunion day Celebration. Janina and Beverly set up a display of our archives for the Sisters of St Joseph Tea and Tour of the Motherhouse hosted by Sister Virginia'45, Sister Ann Marshall'56 and Sister Joan O'Sullivan'43.

In 2011, they also set up a similar display for the Tea held at St Joseph's Healthcare Juravinski Tower, to commemorate the esact day, September 8, 1911 of the official opening of the School of Nursing

In 2015, the Alumnae celebrated 100 years of our Alumnae. "Memories, Friends and Treasures" was written by Janina Muta Berenyi'65, Beverly Shynal Greenwood'70 and Connie Beamer Prowse'69.

Janina also orchestrated an Archival Oral History Film Project of Sister Virginia Hanlon, Sister Joan O'Sullivan (aka Sister Celestine, Sister Ann Marshall (aka Sister Maris Stella), Isobel Kerr, and Virginia Frere, done in celebration of the 100 years of S.J.S.N.A.A.

Janina organized the documentation of our books, legacy and contribution into the Canadian Catholic Hospital Digital History Book Collection. Janina and Connie spent time at the Sisters of St Joseph Convent working with the archivist there, gathering all School of Nursing documents. They then spent time with Winnie Doyle working to document our nursing history on the St Joseph's Healthcare website. Janina, Connie and Karen Wilson Martin'69 worked on documenting the transition of our School of Nursing after 1978, to Mohawk College and then to the University Program.

In 2016, initial funds for the Sisters "Comfort Fund" were donated by the class of 1965. This fund was renamed "Honouring the Sisters of St Joseph". Janina administered the funds and arranged for the purchase and delivery of gifts to the nuns. Funds were used to honour special occasions such as birthdays, Christmas and personal needs.

Janina was born in Normandy, France during World War 11. Her family immigrated to Canada in a propeller airplane that caught on fire and crash landed in Iceland. Her family moved to Brantford, Ontario where she attended St John's College. In 1962 she entered St Joseph's School of Nursing Hamilton and graduated in the class of 1965.

Janina was responsible for eliminating the Cuban heels from the normal student uniform. She wore a size 11 shoe and the largest Cuban heel size was a 10. She was sent to Dr Hudecki, orthopedic surgeon at the time, who was instrumental in stopping the wearing of Cuban heels by students.

In 1965 she completed the last few months of training in the O. R. and was hired by Sister Mary Daniel.

In 1966 – 1967 she did postgraduate studies at the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal and management courses at McGill University

1970 she returned to St Joseph's O.R. and worked as Charge Nurse of Neurosurgery Dept.

1972 – 1992 she worked as Head Nurse and Educator in the Operating Room.

1978 DEKNATEL-AWARDS for O.R. EXCELLENCE (Long Island N. Y.)

Janina Berenyi was the recipient of this award sponsored by the Deknatel Suture Company for O.R. Excellent in North American Hospitals (Canada and the U.S.). Submissions were representative of Educational Advancements in St. Joseph's Operating Room. These included criteria by which to measure the competency of the staff in keeping with Certification and Licensure. It also included a "flow sheet" of operations as they occurred throughout an operating room day. Janina received teaching books for the O.R. plus \$2,000 and a Birks Gift certificate

She mentored new staff, resident/sinflexes/clerks and student nurses. Her first student was Curda (Bogoslowski) and her last student was Doo Frishia.

In 1977 she won a "Decknalet" price for North American Hospitals on her concept of "Resource Manuals for Operating Room Medical Devices" with specific pictures on instrumentation. It wasn't until 2002 that also finally was allowed to put that concept into practice in SPD.

1992 she worked as an Urology Charge Narse and started to initiate charges in the Surgnons Kardex systems, in 1995, 2000, 2005, she was certified as a Canadian Pre-Opentive Nare CPH. In 2002 the was asked to work in SPD by Initiation Control and reported to Initiation Control as an Escational Co-Difficular with a mandate to initiate a quality assurance program and upgrade the elemination program. Soon SPD became Bench Mark for Caruada.

In 2003, she won an award from St. Joseph's Hospital for Excellence in Nursing in Mentoring of staff, Also in this same year she was responsible for the concept of initiating an instrument tracking system with Mr.

Over a period of 40 years at St. Joseph's, she also worked in the Intensive Care unit, the Nursing Float, and the Diagnostic Imaging Department.


Teresa joined the Alumnae Executive in 1978 as the Treasurer. She continued in that position until 1980.








Looking Back...Some Memories and Pics from Classes Celebrating in 2022




Class of '72 50th Year Reunion Luncheon June 22, 2022 High Tea at The Innsville in Beamsville
