





Winnifred Walker Class of '47

Winnie Walker from the Simcoe area, entered St. Joseph's School of Nursing in 1943. She completed her Pediatric Affiliation at Children's Hospital in Detroit Michigan in 1945. She graduated from St. Joseph's School of Nursing on May 28,1947 and was awarded a prize for Surgical Nursing and Examination. After graduation, she returned home and worked for a short time as a staff nurse at Norfolk General Hospital. In 1949, she completed a 9 month Post Graduate course in Operating Room Nursing at University Hospital in New York. She then came back to St. Joseph's in Hamilton and worked in the Operating Room in the John St. building. She worked in the Operating Room from 1950-1977 when she retired. She became the O.R. Head Nurse in 1963 when the new Operating Room opened in the Mary Grace Wing. During her career, Winnie saw many changes in the OR and



in Surgery itself, from sterilization procedures, the institution of a Medical Device Reprocessing Area, to "air conditioned" OR's. She instituted the Specialty Charge Nurse positions in the OR.

After retirement, in the 1980's, Winnie worked as a First Aid Nurse for several years and later in the 1990's, she worked in the local museum in her community.

Her father was Nathaniel Walker, born in Alpena Michigan. He was a farmer. Her mother was Harriet Evans, born in Woodhouse Township. Winnie describes her as a housewife. Winnie had 3 brothers & 1 sister. She grew up on the family farm on Gilbert Road R. R. #3 Simcoe. She remembers they did not have hydro on the farm until after the war ended in 1945.

She entered St Joseph's School of Nursing in 1943. She completed her pediatric affiliation at Children's Hospital in Detroit Michigan in 1945. Winnie graduated from St. Joseph's School of Nursing on May 28, 1947 and was awarded a prize for surgical nursing and examination. After graduation she returned home & worked for a short time as a staff nurse in Norfolk General Hospital. She then came back to St Joseph's in Hamilton and worked in the operating room in the John Street building.

In 1949 she completed a 9 month post graduate course in operating room nursing in University Hospital, New York.

She started working in St Joseph's O.R. and she worked in the operating room from 1950 – 1977 until her retirement. The John Street O. R. had 7 air conditioned operating rooms where instruments were sterilized in a high pressure autoclave. There was also a 6 bed recovery room and an X-ray suite with portable units.. She talked about reusing surgical gloves. hey had to be checked for holes and mended with patches if needed. They were then matched in pairs for sizes, powdered, and placed in paper wrappers and sterilized. This practice was stopped in 1968.

The John Street Building had a laundry facility. Linen was washed there & returned to the O.R. Nursing staff folded, wrapped & sterilized all the cotton linen, surgical gowns, lapo sheets, extremity sheets, kidney drapes, craniotomy sheets & green towels

Nurses made their own caps of white gauze material with 2 tails to secure around their head. They were replaced by cotton scrub caps when the new O.R. opened in 1962.

The hospital did not have a medical device reprocessing area. All the instruments were washed in the operating room by the attendant staff. Water & saline bottles were washed & dried, filled & sterilized by the O.R. Nurses.

Winnie remembers using the "specific gravity" autoclave. Nurses needed to check the bookings for the next day cases. Major packs had to be assembled with doctors gowns, major sheet, draw sheets & towels etc. The packs were sterilized by the nursing staff & were wet when the door was opened. Packs had to dry in the autoclave. They were then laid out to dry avoiding contamination.

"Lifting forceps" were used for handling & delivering sterile supplies to the sterile table. A set was located in each O.R. & a set beside each autoclave. They were collected & washed once a week, sterilized & filled with antiseptic. This practice was stopped in the 1970's. Friday night shift collected each set of forceps, emptied the alcohol solution, washed & sterilized all the forceps & containers, poured new alcohol into the containers, and replaced the forceps in the containers.

Cases were booked from 7am – 1pm. When the cases were done, nursing staff alcoholed the shelves in each O.R. They also checked expiratory dates & assembled instrument sets for the following day

She became the O.R. Head Nurse in 1963 when the new O.R. opened in the Mary Grace Wing. This new addition had 12 new air conditioned operating rooms, 2 cysto rooms, 2 fracture rooms, pathology lab, and a teaching Room. The move to the new O. R. took place on a Saturday. The staff moved all the equipment & supplies.

Sister Mary Daniel was in charge of the Operating Room since 1950. She approached Sister Virginia to have specialty charge nurses. There were 12 operating rooms with their own delivery service for clean & contaminated items. The sterile core had 2 gravity displacement autoclaves.

In the 1980's she worked as a first aid nurse for 5 years. In 1988, she broke her leg. Her interests are reading and stamp collecting. In the 1990's Winnie worked part time in the museum in Simcoe.



Sister Mary Daniel was born Charlotte Weadick, October 18, 1919 in Elora Ontario. Her parents were Arthur Weadick and Dorothea Kirvan. Charlotte was the 3rd born child of 8. Her father was born 1887 in Pilkington, Wellington County, Ontario. and spent his life working as a farmer in Elora. He became ill in 1951, sold the farm and moved to Durham Street in Guelph.

Some family history and pictures were obtained by her brother John Weadick and her closest friend Phyllis Kirvan. Her grandmother Margaret Weadick was a registered nurse and worked in the U.S.A. for a long time. Then she became night supervisor at Western Hospital.

Margaret, known as Aunt Peggy, drove a roadster that had a rumble seat.

They said that Sister Mary Daniel was a pretty typical girl of that time. She enjoyed life, very loving and caring. Her cousins Sister Blanche Marie and Sister Genevieve both entered the St Joseph's Convent but Sister Mary Daniel had not spoken about her vocation until she had just entered the convent. Once she entered she was always very devout and never wavered from her decision.

Sister Mary Daniel entered the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1940 and after Profession of Vows, she entered St. Joseph School of Nursing in Hamilton. She was a graduate of the class of 1947. One of her classmates was Sister Genevieve. (her cousin).

She worked for one year at St. Mary's in Kitchener and then returned to St. Joseph's in Hamilton where she was assigned to the Operating Room. Sister Mary Daniel was the Supervisor in the O.R. in John Street Building and then Supervisor of the new Operating Room in Mary Grace Wing, that opened in 1962. There were 12 Operating Rooms. She approached Sister Virginia Hanlon to have specialty charge nurses. Sister Mary Daniel remained in the position of O.R. supervisor until 1972.

She completed post graduate courses in Operating Room Technique at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto and Supervision and Management at the Western University in London, Ontario

When she retired from the Operating Room Sister served the congregation as the local superior of the Sisters at the hospital for 6 years. She then served as Superior of the Sisters and Administrator at the Motherhouse for the next 4 years. After taking a sabbatical for 1 year, she returned to the Motherhouse to act as hostess in the Spirituality Centre.

She volunteered in the Chapel and Outpatients Department at St Josephs in Hamilton

She returned to the Motherhouse at St. Joseph's from 1987 – 1993 to be Sacristan. In 1999 ill health forced her retirement in 2005.





Genevieve Kirvan was the youngest child of 13 in her family. Her father was a carpenter. They lived in Elora Ontario and were of Irish descent. She entered the Convent in 1931 at age 14 and three years later took her vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. Three years later she took her final vows and was given her new name Sister Genevieve. Her older sister Mildred joined the St. Joseph's Order a few months before Genevieve. Her niece Sister Mary Daniel '47 joined the Sisters in 1940.

She worked at the Hamilton Boys Orphanage. She also worked as a registered nurse at St Joseph's Hamilton, St Mary's Hospital in Kitchener and at St Joseph's Hospital in Brantford, where she specialized in obstetrical care. She then cared for the aged in St Joseph's Villa in Dundas.

In the interview she talked about 1972 and "Habit", changes from the traditional habit, to the modified habit with shorter veil and hair showing. Twelve years later, they threw it wide open. A nun could choose the traditional habit, the modified one or go all the way to contemporary. Sister Genevieve chose the street dress, soft colours and flowers. At 80, she got her ears pierced and wore pearls.

At age 63, Sister Genevieve served as Sister Superior.

She talked about The Sisters of St Joseph coming to the city in 1852. In the 1960's there were 304 members. At the time of the interview there were 79 and the average age was 75. There had not been a new recruit for 15 years. She stated that the work goes on with the poor and the marginalized, talking about the "Out of the Cold Program"



Marygrove was built in 1869 at the corner of James Street South and St. Joseph's Drive. The hospital purchased Marygrove on September 15, 1947, for use as a nurses' residence. In 1960 it was demolished when construction of the new surgical building began.

MARYGROVE

Originally the building was known as "Elmwood", owned by Senator Andrew T. Wood in 1875.

It was located at 265 James Street South. located at the corner of James St. and St. Joseph's Drive.

In 1947, the hospital purchased this property for use as a nurses residence. In 1960 it was demolished when construction of the new surgical wing began.

OAKBANK

Located at 301 James Street South (corner of James St. and St. Joseph's Drive),

This home was originally built for John Stinson in the mid-1850s. It was named for the huge, very old, oak tree on the front yard.

Edward, the Prince of Wales, stayed at Oakbank in 1860 when he attended the opening ceremonies of the city's waterworks system.

Oakbank was purchased in 1947 and used as a nurses residence until it was demolished in 1960.

Feature of the plan for each unit is the service tower from which 4 wings radiate.

Located in the centre of the cross, the service tower allows centralization of services, leaving the wings free for patient accommodation.

In the service tower, will be elevators, nurses stations, nurses rooms, visitors rooms, diet kitchens, utility rooms and storage space.

Saturday May 3, 1947

The official opening of the hospital took place Saturday May 3, 1947.

Sister Superior St Edward extended an invitation for an "open house" on Sunday afternoon between 1pm and 6pm

Open house also took place on Tuesday and Wednesday of the next week between 1:30pm and 5pm.



NEW ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL TO CONTAIN 400 BEDS—Announcement is made to-day by the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of an extensive building program to provide a modern hospital with 400 beds. The new hospital, embodying all that is modern and efficient in design, will rise on the site of the present hospital. The architect's sketch, reproduced here, gives an over-all picture of the development. Two new units are to be built, the northerly one to be commenced on Monday. When this is completed, construction of the second one, adjoining it on the south, will be undertaken. The southerly unit, to be built on the site of the present hospital, will be connected with what was formerly the surgical wing (top left in the sketch) and which now becomes an 80-bed maternity hospital. Casa Maria is to be abandoned and the old Young residence, which forms the administrative wing of the present hospital, will be torn down as construction progresses.





May 3, 1947 The newly completed wing of St Joseph's Hospital was to be the site of a new chapel but the demand for increased bed space made it inadvisable. A new and much larger chapel would be built in the second wing of the hospital

Mass was celebrated by His Excellency the Most Reverend J. F. Ryan, Bishop of Hamilton. Mass was celebrated in a temporary altar in the main foyer.

About a thousand guests were expected to attend the reception and tea following the formal opening of the new wing of St Joseph Hospital. They were received by Rev. Sister Mary St. Edward, Superintendent of the hospital, Sister M. Irene and Mrs S.H. O'Brien, President of St. Joseph's Auxilary. Guests were escorted through the new hospital section by nurses in uniform under the supervision of Sister M. Ursula Superintendent of nurses.





"Cross shaped" Hospital Addition located between Charlton Avenue, John St. S. and St. Joseph's Drive had the main entrance facing John Street. The new addition increased accommodation to 394 patients.

Patient rooms were in the 4 wings with a central rotunda which housed elevators, nursing stations, kitchen, utility and storage space.

All sterile supplies for the floors were taken care of in a central supply room where a complete sterilization unit was installed.

- 2 dumb waiters were installed on the ground floor.
- ..1 for clean supplies to be sent to patient areas.
- ..1 for soiled articles to be returned for processing.

There were 7 air conditioned operating rooms on the top floor. There was also a 6 bed recovery room and an x-ray suite with portable units. The emergency department was located on the lower floor
