




Remember how you wondered before you came in training what it would be like, what you would study and what residence life would be like? Yes, of course, you do. And realizing this, the School of Nursing embarked this year on an "orientation to nursing" programme for district high school girls. This is a twofold plan. Starting in January, a group, including the Director of Nurses, or the Director of Nursing Education, a clinical instructor, a senior, intermediate and junior student visited Loretto Academy, Niagara Falls, Loretto Academy, Hamilton, Notre Dame, Waterdown and Cathedral High School, Hamilton. Each member of the group gave a short resume of their work, duties and studies. A question period followed. The groups were very well received and they enjoyed the experience as much as their audiences.

The second part of the programme was an "At Home" for the girls from the Hamilton high schools. On February 23rd, approximately 90 girls came to visit St. Joseph's. They were greeted by member of the junior class and shown to the auditorium where a movie depicting a day in the life of a student nurse was shown after a welcoming address by Sister Mary Virginia, Director of Nurses.

On display in the auditorium were several attractive posters concerning interesting points about nursing. These were drawn up by the intermediate nurses. Next on the agenda, was a tour of the hospital conducted by an instructor, senior and intermediate student. Following the tour a lunch was served in the auditorium by members of the senior class.

Both the visits and the at-home were thoroughly enjoyed by the students and their visitors. We felt that this programme not only envoked a greater interest in nursing but also a deeper pride in the students for their school and profession.

"Going on affiliation" means three months of five-day weeks countless late leaves, residence freedom plus, plus!, sharing experiences and "beefs" with fellow affiliates. It is "shower day" twice a week in a steam-filled room, rummy, scrabble, badminton and movies. It means assisting with insulin, largactil and electro-convulsive therapy; observing psychotherapy — in progress all day every day with the irreplaceable "O.T." department — where activity and the creation of interest is considered to be the essence of psychiatric nursing care.

It means discouragement to see hundreds of people who fail to respond, living caricatures of personality, spending their years under conditions that are still less than ideal. Yet there is pure wonder and encouragement to observe daily improvement and the eventual discharge of more hundreds of acute cases.




Whether or not the work has been a pleasant experience for you begin to realize towards the final weeks, just what it has given you





Shirley Rutter was born in Cobourg Ontario.

During her student days she was a member of the Canadian Naval Reserve and for a time served on the Canadian aircraft carrier, HMS Bonaventure.

She is a graduate of St Joseph's School of Nursing, class of 1958.

She worked in the Emergency Department at St Joseph's Hospital Hamilton and then in the community with family physician Dr Vincent Rudnick.

Nurse practitioners first came about in the province in the early 1970's and Shirley graduated from McMaster's program in 1973.

She was a member of the school's second graduating class, when only McMaster and Western University offered the program. She was one of the first nurse practitioners in Ontario. She worked as a nurse practitioner at the McMaster University Medical Centre.

In 1980 she was appointed Assistant Clinical Professor in the Department of Family Medicine at McMaster University.

67 nurses were graduates in the class of 1958. Graduation exercises were held on Wednesday May 28<sup>th</sup> 1958 in the Auditorium at Cathedral Girls High School.

Dr W. P. Downes, chief of medical staff was chairman of the event.

Diplomas and pins were presented by Rt. Rev. J. F. Hinchey.

Guest speaker was Joseph M. Pigott, Chairman of the Hospital Advisory Board.

Other speakers included Controller Leslie Parker,

Dr C. L. Bates, President of the Hamilton Academy of Medicine and D. C. Gaskin.



#### SANITORIUM AFFILIATION

During our training we had the opportunity of spending one mortal at the Mountain Sanitorium.

It is interesting to note that the Sanitorium was opened in 1906 and had, at one time, 750 patients, plus a long waiting list. Today of the seven buildings, only four contain approximately 445 patients. This is a great indication of the decrease in tuberculosis during the past 10—15 years. This is due to the discovery of the newer drugs PAS, Streptoman and Isoniazid.

The affiliation was divided between class lectures and experience. Some were fortunate enough to witness a bronchost examination and a demonstration of the expansion and contraction of pair of human lungs with the use of oxygen and carbon dioxide. Same x-rays of the different areas in the human body where tuberculoss calledge—lungs, kidneys, bones and joints and following through in the case histories from admission x-rays to discharge x-rays proved to be most interesting.

Most of the patients now hospitalized here are Eskimos and Infair Their cultures and customs are indeed in itself an education. They are such a happy and affectionate group of people, and adjust quickly to civilization. The Eskimos are very talented at soap-stone carving and making parkas and slippers. The Indians still retain their knows salls in wood-carving and bead embroidery.

The spacious grounds, beautiful scenery, clear crisp air, cheefil attitude of the patients, plus the warm friendliness of the staff make a Sanitorium truly live up to its nickname of "The Ivory Tower."

## MASS AND BREAKFAST



Numerous factors contribute to make us think and act the way we do. Though we all have a common nature, we each have an individual personality. We are results of heredity and environment, and who provides us with both? — our parents. We stand to-day to take our place in the world as graduate nurses primarily because our parents through kindness and many sacrifices have made possible the attainment of our goal. They have given inspiration and generosity to our youthful days, courage and constancy to our womanhood. For these we express deep gratitude and hope your pride in us this graduation day will repay you at least in a small way.




To our doctors, who have given generously of their time for our instructions, enlightenment and care during our illnesses, we express our appreciation.

Woman is made to love, to give herself in personal, devoted service, and can only be truly happy when she is fulfilling this.


Carol lost her graduation ring in 1965. She had taken her children to the Ice Capades in Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto.

Would Clear Hospital
Within Four Hours

Hamilton, April 21 (Staff)—A disaster plan which would empty St. Joseph's Hospital of regular patients and provide beds within four hours for 258 disaster victims has been adopted by the Sisters of St. Joseph.

The plan, which would provide emergency accommodation for an additional 250 victims after the four-hour period, involves evacuating 90 per cent of the regular patients from the 500-bed hospital.

"The plan would be used in the event of an atomic attack," said Sister Mary Grace, superintendent of the hospital, "but we are chiefly concerned with the possibility of a civilian catastrophe. It could come from a hurricane, a serious train wreck, or an industrial explosion."

While some aspects of the plan are co-ordinated with civil defense, the hospital is prepared to stand on its own fee when confronted with a major emergency, the sister said.

The sprawling Church of the Ascension on Charlton Ave just north of the hospital, is the key to the disaster plan.

Church officials have turned over the entire building to the hospital to be used as a receiving and immediate treatmen centre. Duplicate keys to the church are contained in locked despatch box in the hospital under the supervision of a senior sister of the order.

The first phase of the pla calls for commencement of evacuation immediately word of the disaster and its extent received. During the past year checking has shown an averag of 258 bed patients could be moved to other quarters without seriously affecting the conditions.

Meanwhile, an elaborate call system will have been set in motion, key persons called outside the hospital will be responsible for phoning other personnel, ranging from surgical specialists to cleaning women. Within an hour it is expected that 600 personnel in all departments can be told to report for duty.

The hospital's 200 nurses aleady have been told in their ectures they can expect only lood, sweat and tears, if alled in on the disaster plan. their shift will last as long as he emergency does.

Across the street, medical teams of doctors and nurses will be setting up in the church.

There, plans call for a circular routing of casualties as they come, with the stress laid on a smooth flow of the injured to the emptying hospital beds across Charlton Ave.

A medical team at the receiving door will split the stream, directing first-aid cases in one direction and those requiring serious treatment, and the dead, in another.

The gymnasium of the church will be used as a resuscitation room; the Sunday school auditorium as a treatment centre. A basement Sunday school coom will be taken over by first-aid teams. A tiny lecture room will become an information centre.

A team of girls working inder the hospital's information fificer Sister Cleophas, will move into the auditorium of Indermount Nurses' Residence, outh of Mountain Blvd.

Their task will be to record the name and all available information on each disaster victim as it reaches them by runmer from the church. A complete record of all patients evacuate's from the hospital and their destinations also will be kept

and the clergy will be set up beside the information centre. It is expected that within 15 minutes of a victim being admitted to the casualty station, his identity and a tentative assessment of his injuries will be available to relatives at the in-

The second phase of the plan is being worked out in conjunction with the civil defense authorities. At present, it calls for CD to provide 250 stretcher beds within the first 24 hours. These will be disposed in corridors, and in the many tunnels that run beneath the hospital. Emergency medical kits, drugs and other supplies already are being stockpiled.

Volunteer workers will be needed. The sisters are investigating the possibility of enlisting the fathers and brothers of the nurses in training at the hospital, so they could be included in the initial call-up of the nurses themselves.

Beginning this summer each team involved will undergo intensive rehearsals. A full-scale rehearsal is scheduled for

, Marilyn Anne "Dee" Ray, RN, BSN, MSN, MA (Anthro), PhD, CTN-A, FSfAA, FAAN, FESPCH (hon) am a Professor Emeritus and Adjunct Professor at Florida Atlantic University, Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, Boca Raton, Florida, USA.

I wish to thank my classmates and President Cheryl McQueen for this honour to share my story of nursing since graduating from St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing in 1958. I was born in Hamilton, Ontario and became a student nurse at St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing in 1955.

My roommate and friend for three years was Diane Valliere Losier. I was selected as the Red Rose Queen with my classmates Maddie Rowe and Gail Armstrong Bjornsen at graduation in 1958. In late fall of the same year a group of us went to Los Angeles, California and worked at UCLA Medical Center where we were introduced to interesting areas of practice. Many other classmates joined us. Some stayed and many went home.

Droesbeke, an accountant, I was a faculty member at the University of Colorado with Dr. Jean Watson advancing "caring as the essence of nursing," I was recruited to Florida Atlantic University, Boca Raton, Florida in 1989 where I have remained and have held the positions of Eminent Scholar and Professor in caring science, education, administration, and research. I guess you can say, I love nursing, caring science, and teaching. I am a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing (FAAN), and certified as an Advanced Transcultural Nurse (CTN-A). After becoming a United States' citizen, I had a parallel career and served in the United States Air Force Reserve Nurse Corps (USAFR, NC) for 32 years in the field of aerospace nursing. I have written books, the latest, "Transcultural Caring Dynamics in Nursing and Health Care." My Archives of Caring are housed in the Museum at the Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, Florida Atlantic University. I love to come home to Canada and visit with my friends and family and extended families-- Michael (Windsor), Pat (Montreal), Mary (Burlington), Cathy (a graduate of St. Joseph School of Nursing, Class of 1965, Peterborough), and Loretta (Hamilton). I enjoy visiting McMaster University, Faculty of Nursing and have set up an award, Excellence in Nurse Practitioner Education and Practice for nurse practitioner students or faculty. I am especially excited about celebrating with my classmates our 60th anniversary of graduation from our esteemed St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing this coming May 2018. I believe that SJH School of Nursing through education and service provided me with a solid foundation for advancing holistic caring as the essence of nursing.






