


Santa Claus came and requested a talent show in return for presents and when he left, he wished everyone a Merry Christmas.

The first big occasion for those of us in the class of 1963 occurred on the evening of Sunday, December 18th, 1960. We received our caps and this made us, finally, students of the school.



JUNIOR RETREAT


On October 18, 19 and 20th, the Preclinical students of St. Joseph's School of Nursing had a very inspiring retreat given by Father Johnston S. J.

PSYCHIATRIC AFFILIATION
*This affiliation was for 3 months at the Ontario Hospital.
Our education was not limited to psychiatry. We became skilled at scrabble, rummy, bowling and badminton, mainly due to the competition from the patients.
We realized more than ever that nursing serves the needs of the mind and spirit as well as the body.*

Psychiatric Affiliation

It was there in black and white-I was going to the Ontario Hospital for my three months psychiatric affiliation. Suddenly I was filled with emotions of fear, curiosity, apprehension and anxiety.

What would it be like up there? Locked doors, mentally ill patients, insulin therapy, leucotomies, and electro-convulsive therapy-a whole new concept of nursing.

Our education was not limited to psychiatry, for we became quite skilled at scrabble, rummy, bowling and badminton-mainly due to the unanticipated competition we received from the patients.

At times it was very discouraging to see people who were unable to respond or cope with life, spending their years under conditions that are less than ideal. But at the same time it was encouraging to see daily improvement and discharges in the less acute cases.

Now our fear and curiosity has been banished and our whole outlook on psychiatry has been altered, and we realize more than ever that nursing serves the needs of the mind and spirit as well as the body.

Now that our short stay is over we can look back and see that our experience at the Ontario Hospital will be of inestimable value to us. In our role as health teacher we can help the public to adapt a mature attitude and to eradicate the stigma attached to mental illness.

A Day To Remember

Thursday October 18, 1962

Thursday, October 18, 1962: What an occasion for the Sisters of St. Joseph: an addition to St. Joseph's Hospital was opened.

For many years it was known that more beds were needed to care for the sick in Hamilton and the surrounding district. However beds were not enough. There would have to be new equipment and new ideas to keep up with the ever increasing modern world.

The cost of such a project was stupendous. Yet the Sisters were not daunted. \$9,000,000 required to complete this dream was raised by government and municipal grants along with the contributions from the citizens of Hamilton.

The 400 bed addition designed by Prock & Prock and built by Pigott Construction Limited serves all fields of hospital administration. New operating rooms, admitting and emergency departments together with dietary facilities use new designs in automation to lessen and simplify hospital methods and medical care. The patient care areas on 3rd to 7th floor use intercom systems to allow conversation between patients and the nurse. Cross contamination has been cut down to a minimum by having cupboards in each room for sterile supplies and another cupboard for dirty supplies. All these conveniences will enable the nurse to spend more time with her patients and increase the nursing care each receives.

Not only are working areas improved but teaching rooms for doctors and nurses have been introduced. The new laboratory with sections devoted to each branch of pathology contains classrooms and museum to aid the staff to learn more about pathology in all fields.

All these and more innovations are combined in an eight storey building made of sand-lime brick with contrasting blue glazed brick panes.

Through this addition officially a ceremony highlighted by addresses from Mr. Joseph M. Pigott, Mayor Lloyd Jackson, Right Rev. J. A. O'Brien O. P. V. G., and The Honourable John P. Robarts O. C., Minister of Ontario were heard. A guard of honour formed by the student nurses directed the dignitaries to the main doors where a gold key was presented to J. Pigott and the new wing was announced officially opened.



Our New Home - Fontbonne Hall

This year of 1963, we have seen the opening of our new residence - Fontbonne Hall. This building is named after the founder of the St. Joseph Order - Mother St. John Fontbonne.

The history of St. Joseph's School of Nursing begins with the opening of St. Joseph's Hospital in 1890, after urgent requests and appeals of medical men and citizens of Hamilton.

That year, in June, St. Joseph's opened with a bed capacity of twenty-five, under the capable direction of Mother Phillip. The people of Hamilton of all denominations showed their approval.

Since the opening of St. Joseph's Hospital in 1890, nursing has undergone many changes. In those days the hospital possessed few labour - saving devices. No personal sacrifice was felt too great for these pioneer Sisters, to whom is due, in a large measure, the success of those who have followed in their footsteps.

In 1911, due to the growth of the hospital, the Sisters decided to open a school for lay nurses. So numerous were the applications for St. Joseph's School in Guelph, which was under the direction of Sisters Leo and Martina, that some of these ladies were referred to Hamilton. In September of that year, the first students were enrolled. The nurses' residence at the time was the Adam Brown residence, the site of Undermount.

Their uniform, the traditional blue and white, was identical with that of to-day, with the exception of the collar, and other modifications necessary to befit the times. All uniforms were made at home, according to specifications. The cap of the school was given as soon as the probationer was deemed worthy of it. Hours of duty were long, but having that true spirit of service to others, upon which nursing was based, they felt the one hour off duty permitted for rest and recreation was a privilege. Lectures were given after duty hours, by Doctors Balfe, Olmstead, Edgar and Sullivan, who gave freely of their time for the benefit of the student nurses.

January, 1915, found the first group of nurses ready for graduation. Instead of the traditional May day, the ground was covered with a great white blanket of snow. The impressive and elaborate ceremony took place in the lecture hall amidst prominent members of Hamilton clergy, laity and medical professions. Huge bouquets of pink roses were presented to the graduates. After the ceremony, the nurses returned to duty, and to their patients.

In 1920, plans were made by the government for registration of nurses. This was the signal for extensive improvements in all schools that hoped to be accredited. In the same year, work commenced on Undermount Residence. Student enrollment at this time numbered 50.

Later, as enrollment increased, it was deemed necessary to add the extra residences of Marygrove and Oakbank. Staff Residence was built for the occupancy of graduate staff in the hospital.

Several years ago, with the imminent increase in student enrollment, the Sisters of St. Joseph started to plan the construction of our new residence. At this time, Staff and Marygrove Residences were demolished in order to leave room for the new hospital addition.

Construction began in the spring of 1961, and by early 1963, in February, the residence was ready for occupancy. Many thanks to our architects Prack and Prack, and to our builder Mr. Piggott.

Moving day was set for February, although the Junior Class had been having lectures in the new classrooms for several days.

At this time, the Most Reverend J. F. Ryan, Bishop of Hamilton, bestowed his blessing on our new residence. This was truly a day to remember.

VOX OMNIUM 1963

History of St Joseph's School of Nursing begins with the opening of St Joseph's Hospital in 1890 June 1890 St Joseph's opened with a bed capacity of 25 under the direction of Mother Phillip. Since then, nursing has undergone many changes. The hospital possessed few labour – saving devices. No personal sacrifice was felt too great for those pioneer Sisters .

1911 due to the growth of the hospital, the Sisters decided to open a school for lay nurses. In September 1911 the first students were enrolled. The nurses' residence at the time was the Adam Brown Residence, the site of Undermount.

Nurses' uniforms, the traditional blue and white was identical with that of to-day with the exception of the collar and other modifications necessary to befit the times. All uniforms were made at home, according to specifications. The cap of the school was given as the probationer was deemed worthy of it. Hours of duty were long. One hour off duty permitted for rest and recreation was a privilege. Lectures were given after duty hours by doctors.

January 1915 was the 1st nurses' graduation. Huge bouquets of pink roses were presented to the graduates.

1920 the government planned for registration of nurses. Student enrollment at this time was 50. Undermount Nurses Residence opened November 28, 1922

Enrollment increased.

1947, Oakbank and Marygrove residence were purchased. Parham staff residence was built for the occupancy of graduate staff in the hospital.

Student enrollment continued to increase. The Sisters of St Joseph started to plan the construction of a new nurses residence. Marygrove, Oakbank and Parham residences were demolished. Construction began in the spring of 1961 and the residence was ready for occupancy in February 1963.

Most Reverend J.F. Ryan, the Bishop of Hamilton bestowed his blessing on our new building.





It is an 8 storey building. The exterior is blue and gray brick with marble trim. In front is a large lawn with many shrubs, light standards lining the main driveway and flower gardens.

**1st floor had classrooms, offices for administrative staff, a fully equipped laboratory for scientific experiments, and a large library covering all fields of medicine and nursing.
Front entrance was on James St. South with a waiting room for friends and visitors.
Switchboard was located near the front entrance with communications to each room in the residence.
Large gymnasium s located to the south of the 1st floor for use by the students for sports and meetings.**

**Floors 2, 3, and 4 had private rooms and were occupied by the senior students.
Floors 5, 6 and 7 had double rooms and were occupied by the second year students
Each of these floors had 2 larger rooms for student council executive or for visiting guests.**

**On each floor there was a lounge and a fully equipped kitchen
The roof was divided into games and T.V. area.
A television and stereo had been donated by the Alumnae.**



Fontbonne Hall is a tall building - eight stories in height. The exterior is of blue and grey brick with marble trim. In front, a large lawn with shrubs dotting it, light standards lining the main driveway and the flower-studded gardens make it the picture of a truly beautiful residence.

The first floor is compromised mainly of classrooms and offices for administrative staff. There is also a fully equipped laboratory, in which scientific experiments may be carried out. A large library with a very great assortment of volumes dealing with all fields of medicine and nursing, are at the disposal of all the nursing students.

The entrance of our new residence is on the James St. side, where one is ushered into a luxurious waiting room, handsomely decorated. The switchboard is located at the rear of this area, with communications to each room in the residence.

A large gymnasium to the south of the first floor, has been built for use by the students for such activities as sports and meetings.

The next six floors compromise the living quarters for the student body. There are private rooms on the first three floors, while the last three have double rooms. On each floor, there are two larger rooms set aside for Student Council Executive or for visiting guests.

On each floor, there is a lounge, where students may spend their spare time, chatting. Off this room, there is a fully equipped kitchen, where one may prepare the inevitable cup of coffee.

The "roof" is divided into games and T. V. areas. This is for use of all three classes. A T. V. set and stereo have been very generously donated to us by the Alumnae. Many pleasant hours after duty are spent here.

Speaker One: First we must thank the Alumnae Association Executive Committee for organizing this special evening.
 Speaker Two: They do it year after year and it never gets old.
 Speaker One: Sometimes we might convulse the St. Joseph's School of Nursing with the Alumnae Association. But they are separate entities who worked together to give us the best training experience possible.
 Speaker Two: Our years at St. Joseph's opened our eyes hearts, and doors that we walked through together hand in hand.
 Speaker One: On August 31, 1960 we were welcomed into the school by our seniors at a reception on the lawn of Undermount. Later after the formalities, they showed us to our rooms.
 Speaker Two: Two or three total strangers were thrown into one room.
 Speaker One: Then the door slammed shut behind us.
 Speaker Two: Someone famously coined the phrase: "The door that let you in will let you out."
 Speaker One: Do you suppose that someone was naive enough not to know that the same was true for the windows of Undermount and Parham?
 Speaker Two: Remember Undermount? Below the two floors of dorm rooms there was a tiny kitchen at the foot of the stairs where tea and toast were always available.
 Speaker One: With a hifi in the waiting room where only the music of Mantovani and Lawrence Welk were allowed.
 Speaker Two: In the probation period, there were strict rules regarding uniforms and personal appearance. We wore starched bibs and apron, stiff collars, cuffs and belts, shoes with Cuban heels and capes.
 Speaker One: We were the picture of youthful beauty, except our hair could not touch our collars.
 Speaker Two: Who knew that shoe laces were useful for more than tying your shoes?
 Speaker One: That they were to become part of our intimate apparel? And they had to be washed after each shift?
 Speaker Two: Our days started very early with roll call at 6:00 a.m. at the chapel.
 Speaker One: Mass for the Catholics. First to breakfast for the non-Catholics.
 Speaker Two: but to get to the chapel we had to pass through "the tunnel". If you took a wrong turn you could get lost in that tunnel and end up in the furnace room. It was like going stright to hell.
 Speaker One: If you were lucky enough to be living at Parham you just had to step out the front door and cross the street. Crossing John Street was never a problem. If traffic didn't stop at the sight of the uniform, a little flash of leg would do the trick.
 Speaker Two: The first text book we studied was "The Art, Science and Spirit of Nursing".
 Speaker One: The words "economy of time, effort and materials" were drilled into our little heads.
 Speaker Two: Who is this room does not to this day still mitre the corners of their bed sheets?
 Speaker One: In our intermediate year we were capped, pinned, put on shifts and given way too much responsibility for our tender years.
 Speaker Two: We learned valuable lessons: 1. about the difference between the laundry chute and the bed pan hopper. 2. that chasing bats on B floor was part of the job 3. that you could be called back to the ward, no matter how exhausted you were, if you had dared to leave a task undone.
 Speaker One: There is still an unsolved mystery about a beef brisket that disappeared from the diet kitchen about that time.
 Speaker Two: Next with black band on our caps, we marched into our senior year.
 Speaker One: There were big changes happening at St. Joe's during our intermediate and senior years. In October 1962 the eight story Charlton Wing was opened with 400 beds and state of the art technology in all the clinical areas.
 Speaker Two: The opening was attended by many local and provincial dignitaries. It was our class that made up the guard of honour and served as guides.
 Speaker One: By then hemlines were up and heels were down.

should have reached \$12.00 a month but never did.
 Speaker One: Back then you could have BBQ Chicken on a bun with fries for about \$1.50 at the Chicken Roost.
 Speaker Two: The movie Psycho was a big hit that year. After seeing it, some of us were afraid to take a shower alone for months.
 Speaker One: There were many events leading up to Graduation in the Spring of 1963.
 Speaker Two: In February we moved into our new home, Fontbonne Hall, where for the first time we were all under one roof and most of us had private rooms. Fontbonne had a large gymnasium that at various times was used for sports, meetings and special functions.
 Speaker One: We held our Red Rose Ball in that room on May 17, 1963. It was a "uniform dance". It was like being confined to residence set to music.
 Speaker Two: Miss Diane McRaie was our Red Rose Queen and Misses Carol McPherson and Sylvia Evanik were her princesses.
 Speaker One: That dance and many others over the years were generously sponsored by the Alumnae Association.
 Speaker Two: In those pre deejay days, someone had to pay for those big bands we loved to dance to. We just didn't realize where the money was coming from.
 Speaker One: There was the command appearance for everyone who wasn't on shift, to attend, in full uniform, the Alumnae Banquet held at the Royal Connaught Hotel on May the 8th.
 Speaker Two: Ditto for the Mother, Father Daughter Banquet.
 Speaker One: The RNAO reception that brought us together with the graduating class from the Hamilton General Hospital on May 15 to explain to us the benefits of membership.
 Speaker Two: Before we knew it, it was Graduation Day, May 22, 1963.
 Speaker One: A day that started so hopefully with Mass and a special breakfast in the new cafeteria.
 Speaker Two: Then the hammer came down. Seems the hijinks of the night before had made the news and the powers that be were not amused.
 Speaker One: The day progressed on schedule: the crisp new white uniforms, the bus ride down to Cathedral Girls High School, the procession into the auditorium, the Oaths, the Blessings, the pictures, the after-parties with family and friends.
 Speaker Two: The confinement to residence when we returned to duty the following week.
 Speaker One: It was all part of our transformation from know-it-all high school seniors, through lowest of the low probationers to the lofty heights of graduate nurses.
 Speaker Two: We solemnly remember our classmates: Maureen Curran, Judy Essex, Collette Ethier, Phyllis Mancuso, Carol Powers, Jean Pundius, Barb Robertson and Barb Sauders, all who didn't live to see this golden anniversary. God be with them.
 Speaker Two: Bugt the hospital and the school of nursing also underwent major changes.
 Speaker One: When the Charlton wing opened, the hospital's motto was "it is an honour to serve the sick". That motto was posted near the elevators in the new entrance, for all to see. The patients, their visitor and the hospital staff knew that it was what St. Joseph's stood for.
 Speaker Two: Little by little the Sisters lost control of the hospital. In 1960 a Board of Directors was put in place and for the first time a non-religious was in charge.
 Speaker One: In 1965 a regional health care system came into effect. St. Joseph's lost Maternity but gained a Chest and Allergy Clinic, a Nephrology Unit, Toxicology and Emergency Psychiatry.
 Speaker Two: Through all the changes the Sisters held the Board of Trustees to the principle of exemplary health care with an emphasis on spiritual and emotional needs.
 Speaker One: What made St. Joseph's different was the establishment of the Pastoral Service and Palliative Care.
 Speaker Two: Now St. Joseph's is folded into the Hamilton Health care Services, with five campuses across the city.
 Speaker One: The motto while still in the same place in the entrance, has changed to reflect a broader mission. It now reads "It is an honour to serve the community".
 Speaker Two: Next time you are in the foyer, look up and be proud.
 Speaker One: So while the hospital as we knew it no longer exists and the School of Nursing is gone, what we have left is this Alumnae Association. It has carried on and held us all together through the metamorphosis.
 Speaker Two: I fear we may not have appreciated at the time that the Alumnae Association was a very dynamic group who supported the students through it all.
 Speaker One: Today we should all be members of this group. There is no other like it. Unfortunately, it too is doomed to extinction. So while we can, let's get behind them and return the favour.
 Speaker Two: Please rise, raise a glass and toast our Alma Mater.
 Speaker One: To our Alma Mater, Cheers!
