Interesting facts about the work done at St. Joseph's in the last year were given by the chief of staff. The 550-bed hos-pital required 750 people to look after its patients - of which, in 1953, there were 20,000 bed (indoor) patients, and 34,000 in the outdoor department. He added that another new wing is badly needed to keep up with the demand for







