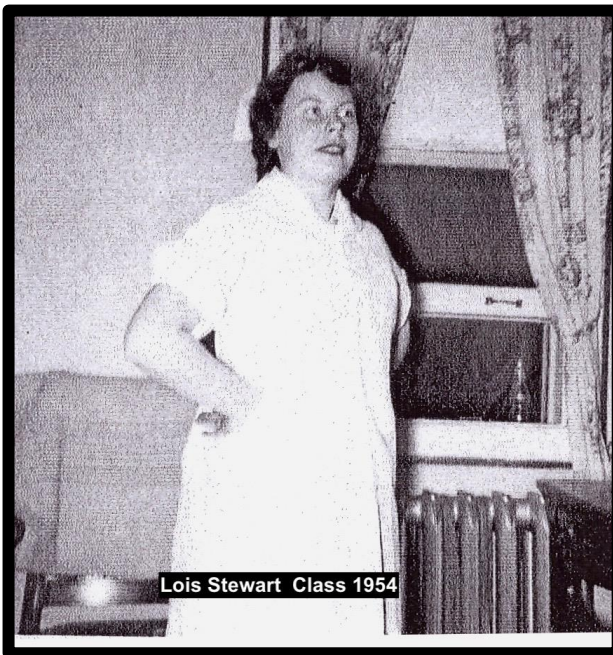

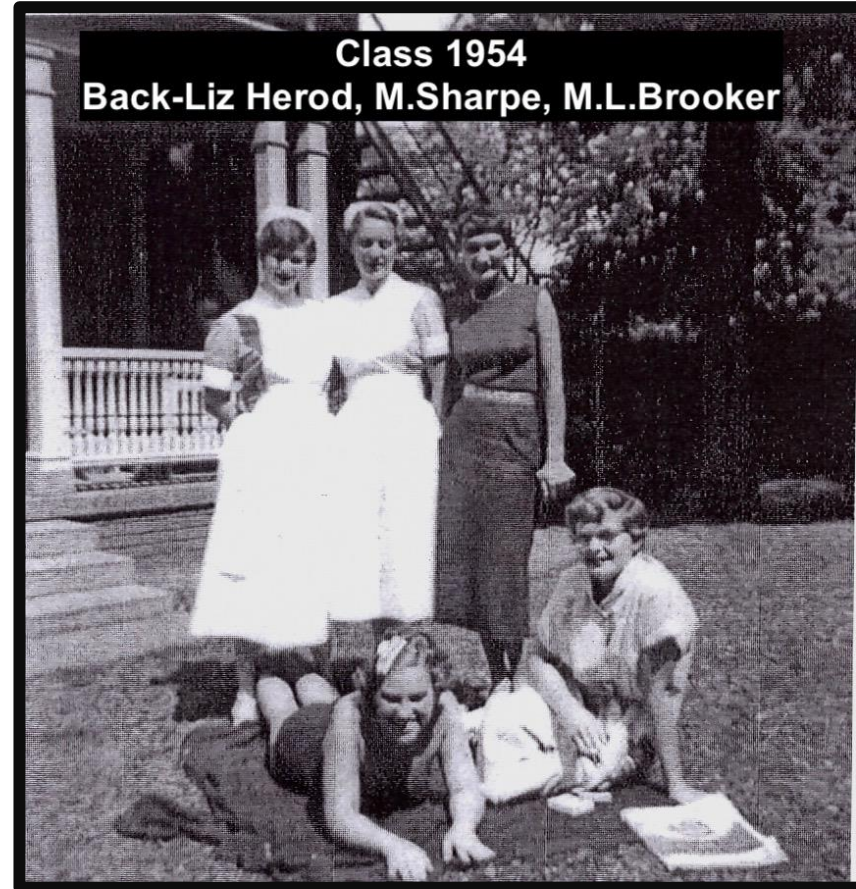

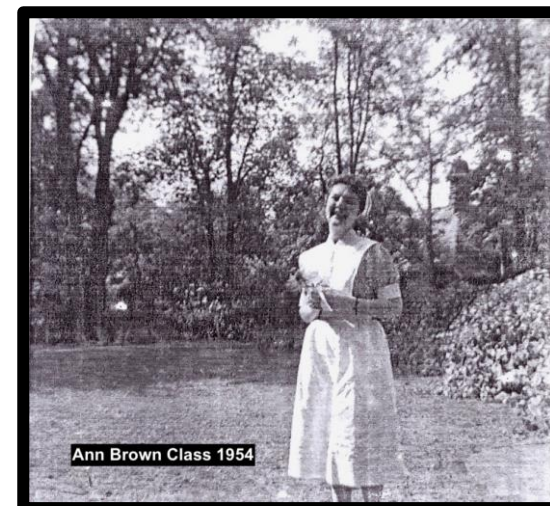

# Large Class Of Nurses Graduates Tomorrow

Sixty-four young women — making up the largest class to finish the course of the School of Nursing in the history of St. Joseph's Hospital to date, will graduate at the annual graduation exercises being held tomorrow afternoon, at 3 o'clock, in the auditorium of the Cathedral of Christ the King. Most Rev. C. L. Nelligan, Assumption College, Windsor, Titular Bishop of Seneca, will give the graduation address.

A change has been made in the system of giving prizes this year. While fewer are being given, they have a special purpose of stimulating leadership in the nursing field, being in the form of scholarships for already graduated and graduating nurses, and as prizes for highest standing in theory in each of the three student years.

# Urges New Nurses Aid To Banish Materialism

The Most Rev. C. L. Nelligan, D., Windsor, addressed the graduating class of St. Joseph's Hospital, telling them that a graduation of nurses always as an impressive and inspiring ceremony, its significance seemed to him to spring from the fact that "a number of young women, after three years of careful and comprehensive training in an atmosphere of religion and in accordance with the ethical principles of their chosen profession, now stand in the cavelled hour so long and eagerly anticipated. The foundations have been laid deep and solid and substantial, and the interlacing of religious faith is the guarantee of their enduring stability."

## "Good Parents"

The Bishop continued, "I wish first of all to extend my sincere congratulations to a group who are all too frequently forgotten on an occasion like this. I have reference to the good parents whose sacrifices, oftentimes heroic, have made this graduation day possible. If, indeed, the crown of success rests securely upon the heads of these young women this afternoon, it is due in a large measure to the encouragement and inspiration received from their parents, and to their never-failing support and sympathy in the difficult and sometimes discouraging struggle towards the realization of long-cherished ambitions."

"And now my dear graduates, I want to speak to you with all the profound conviction and sincerity of my soul. I need hardly remind you at the very outset that yours is one of the noblest professions to which a woman can aspire. It is a work which the Great Physician Himself signally blessed as done unto Himself—I was sick, and you visited Me."

"The nursing profession as we know it today has indeed a great wealth of tradition. It embraces the courage, the self-sacrifice and the devotedness of Florence Nightingale who with a number of Irish Sisters of Charity and Sisters of Mercy, and a small group of lay nurses, effected a most necessary reform in the care of the British wounded during the Crimean War."

## Lauds Nurses

Bishop Nelligan recalled the glorious deeds of nurses in peace and war in past and recent years, their sacrifices in prisons, on battlefields and in hospitals, and the comfort brought to suffering men. With eloquence and feeling he depicted the unselfishness and skill of these women of faith and

important role in the solution of the manifold problems with which we are faced today. There is no denying the fact that we are passing through the most critical period in the whole history of the world.

"But the struggle wherein the greatest values are at stake is that within the souls of men. It is a struggle to the death between Christianity on the one hand, and materialism on the other, under whatever ideology this latter may present itself. It is evident that a wave of materialism has been sweeping over the world, with the result that today the human body is looked upon as expendable material, as something to be eliminated wholesale by the atom or the hydrogen bomb. The growth of this spirit of materialism is particularly noticeable between the First and the Second World Wars.

## Great Task

"It will be your glorious apostolate, my dear graduates, to help bring the world back to God, so that through the alchemy of Christian charity and devoted service, the sacred fires may be kindled once again in hearts that have grown old and indifferent. May you hear and heed the invitation that the Master gave when He launched His cause upon the pagan world of His time. His call to the apostles was simple and direct. Come, follow Me."

# Bishop Ryan Presents Awards To Graduates

At the annual graduation exercises of St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing, yesterday afternoon, in the auditorium of the Cathedral of Christ the King, 64 nurses were presented with their certificates by the Most Rev. Joseph F. Ryan, Bishop of Hamilton. Graduation pins were pinned on by Sister Bonaventure, director of the School of Nursing.

Dr. W. P. Downes, chief of the medical staff at the hospital, was chairman for the occasion, and extended a welcome on behalf of Sister Geraldine, Mother Superior of the hospital, who, he said, was unable to be present as is customary, because she is convalescing from illness. He congratulated the graduates and their parents, and complimented the director and staff of the School of Nursing. He emphasized that the graduates are not only nurses, they are well-educated young women, with a training equivalent to that of college or university, and expressed pleasure that about ten of them are taking post-graduate work.

## Great Record

Interesting facts about the work done at St. Joseph's in the last year were given by the chief of staff. The 550-bed hospital required 750 people to look after its patients — of which, in 1953, there were 20,000 bed (indoor) patients, and 34,000 in the outdoor department. He added that another new wing is badly needed to keep up with the demand for service.

Bishop Ryan in a brief speech, referred to the contribution being made by St. Joseph's Hospital to the public welfare and the City of Hamilton. In congratulating the class and the Sisters of St. Joseph, he spoke of the part of the parents also in making sacrifice and giving guidance to their daughters, so that they were "now here on the stage" ready to help people meet some of their problems and to help in the world. Some might even be like the heroic nurse in the Indo-Chinese siege, whose courageous action had drawn the admiration of the world, he said.

## Mayor Jackson

Mayor Lloyd D. Jackson extended civic greetings, emphasizing the nurse's role in the community.

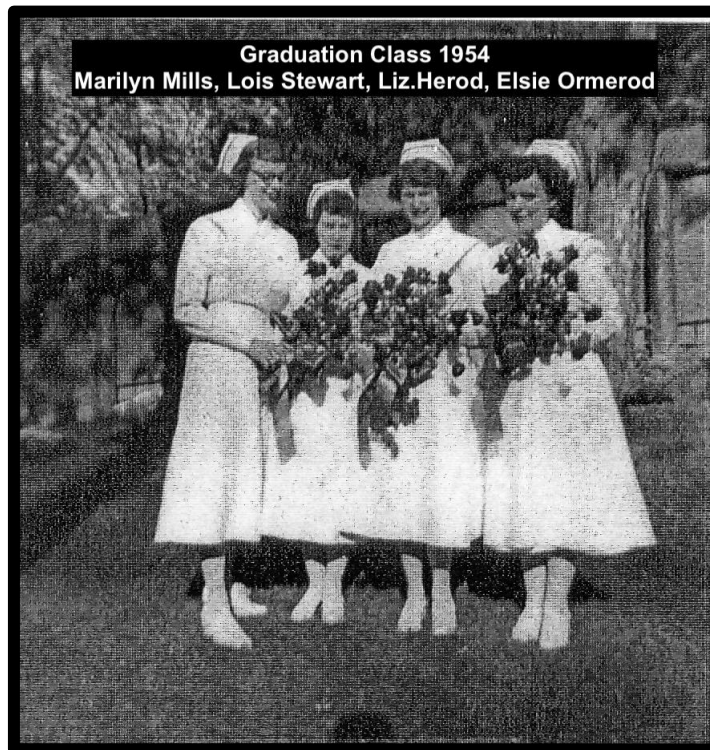
sizing the nurse's need for dedication and her opportunity for service. Dr. Thomas Tweedie, spoke on behalf of the Academy of Medicine of which he is president. He told the nurses they had had an excellent training, but urged that they keep on training in order to give the best of professional service. He said also that he regretted a certain "fragmentation" of attention to patients, now evident in hospitals, through a system in which one nurse is assigned a single small unit of service for all the patients in the ward, so that several nurses are coming and going in giving care to each single patient, but the patient himself has a feeling that he really has no nurse definitely caring for him. He said that patients had expressed this feeling to him.

## Visiting Bishop

Mr. D. C. Gaskin, member of the hospital advisory board, spoke on the excellence of nursing as a profession. Miss Audrey Kempa, of Brantford, one of the class, gave the valedictory. The Most Rev. C. L. Nelligan, Titular Bishop of Seneca, who gave the address to the graduates, was introduced by Bishop Ryan. Mrs. Gordon L. Burjau played organ music, as the large number of parents and friends gathered, and accompaniments during the impressive formal entrance of the class and the program. The Rev. J. A. O'Brien gave the opening prayer.

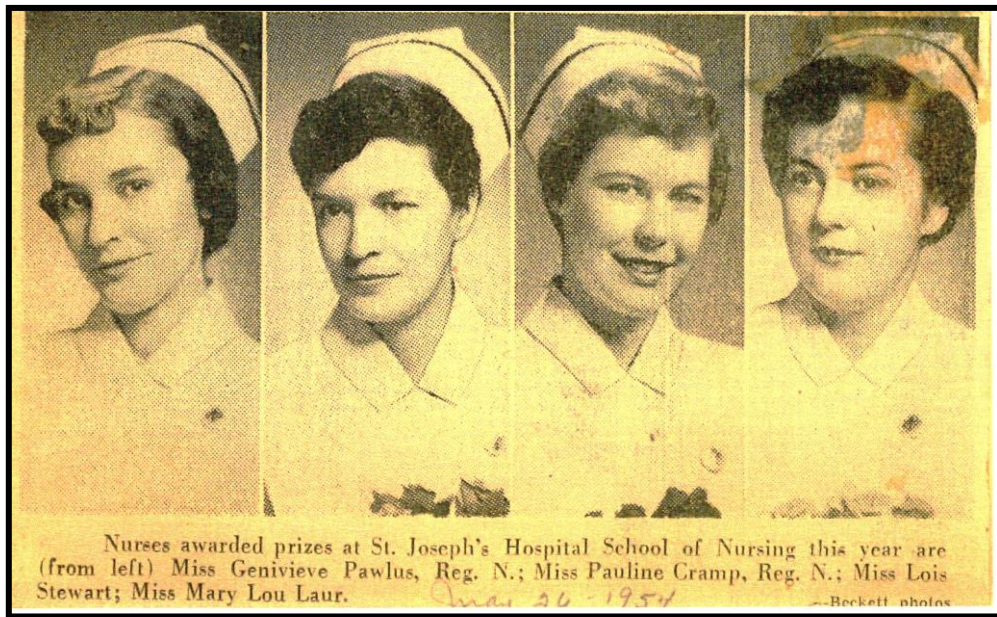

## 'Patient' nurse lauds nurses

BARBARA HOGAN's respect and appreciation for her fellow nurses was enhanced when she became a patient under their care three years ago.

She had worked as a nurse at the West Lincoln Hospital, Grimsby, from 1964 to 1986, when she was diagnosed as having cancer of the liver. She then underwent the first successful liver transplant at Toronto General Hospital.

"The nurses were 'tremendous,' she said. 'After a liver transplant you don't know what's going on for a few days. I respected their skills. My life was in their hands.'

She said changes to the profession since she began nursing in 1964 have been astounding and not necessarily for the better. "There's more technology and machinery. It's not bedside nursing like I was taught. You can get so busy with the vital things that it takes you away from the patient."

Mrs. Hogan of Grimsby was one of 450 alumni attending the 75th reunion of St. Joseph's Hospital school of nursing at the Hamilton Convention Center yesterday. The reunion allowed graduates from as far back as the class of '25 to get together and reminisce about the old times.

From 1911, when the school was established, to 1974, when it was amalgamated with Mohawk College, it graduated 2,069 nurses.

Sophia Guzman, from Tamarac, Florida, took a tour of St. Joseph's Hospital and was saddened by the changes that have occurred since she graduated in 1964.

"It's much bigger. It's all modern now. You wouldn't think it was the same hospital. The nursing residence is all torn down. It was really beautiful. I think there's a parking lot there now."

"I guess it's for the better. Times change. They do things differently now."

Mardi Ballyant, who would not say when she graduated, quit her job at Henderson General Hospital three years ago to start an employment agency for nurses and other health-care providers. She said she enjoyed her job as a nurse but "wanted to try something new."

She said she's following a growing trend among women looking for jobs outside the traditional careers. "Everything is opening up now and women are being more choosy. It used to be that they could only be secretaries, teachers and nurses."

Alumni from all over Canada, the United States and even Tobago and Antigua attended the event. In a speech to the alumni, Hamilton Mayor Bob Morrow said the reunion would serve to "bring the good word of Hamilton far and wide." He declared yesterday "St. Joseph's School of Nursing's Hamilton Alumni Day."
