Nursing book features new learning method

"It's not a very big book, but it's my first," says Betty McEnnes, as she points to a slim gold- and cerise-colored volume on her desk. Rather a humble statement, from a Hamilton

Rather a humble statement, from a Hamilton woman who is the first Canadian to have a book on nursing published by the C. V. Mosby Company of the U.S. — and who has been told by the same publishers that they will be delighted to publish a second book by her as soon as sine can have one ready. Miks McInnes, who is a faculty member at St. Joseph's School of Nursing, wrote to the publishing company enquiring about copyrights for her thesis on the mangement of blood pressure.

The company works back encouraging her to broaden her topic of blood pressure. into all the vital signs (temperature, pulse, respiration, blood pressure) and publish a text book on the subject. "If first submitted the idea to the publishers last December, and the book came out last month," Miss Wetnesser."

McInnes said

"I didn't tell anyone I was writing the book un-til I had confirmation that it was to be published."

She said she chose that particular publishing company because a large number of books used by the school were published by that company. Miss McInnes is a graduate of St. Joseph's School of Nursing. She worked at the Hamilton Gener-al Hospital for a year and did private duty nursing for a year

for a year. Later she decided to obtain a Bacbelor of Science

Later she decret to botain a pachetor of Science in Nursing degrees at the University of Toronto. That degree gave her teaching credentials. Miss McInnes has been on the teaching staff at St. Joseph's for several years, At present she has been relieved from teaching for a year to take up the post of audio-visual co-ordinator for the school.

Last year she completed her Master of Science degree in Education.

"The way nursing is advancing, I felt I needed a further degree, so I did my masters' at the Univ-ersity of Niagara, N.Y., commuting for courses twice a week."

Her thesis for the degree was concerned with programming, and her new book is set out in the programmed manner.

"Programmed instructions is a means of giving a student an organized presentation of the subject mat-ter without the constant attendance of the teacher during the learning process," Miss McInnes ex-plained.

prassed: "It is a method of teaching and learning that makes the learner more independent," she added. Discussing the format of her book, Betty Mc-lames explained that a program consisted of a series of short, numbered satements or paragraphs called


or short, numbered statements or paragraphs called "frames". "Each consists of factual material that is ar-ranged in small, logical steps so that knowledge pro-ceeds from the simple to the complex.

"It's an easy way to learn, and the students like it. It's a form of independent learning."

Miss McInnes said she hoped in a year or two St. Joseph's would be set up for independent learning. She said her book has been accepted by the school and would be taken into the curriculum start-

school and would be taken into the curriculum start-ing next year. "Three-quarters of the shaft have already or-dered copies of the book. The whole staff here is real-ly committed to the philosophy of independent learn-ing."

St. Joseph's, she said, has an ideal opportunity for this type of curriculum because it is the only school of nursing in Ontario equipped with video tape



These learning sessions, called carrels, usually run from 30 to 45 minutes.


However, Betty McInnes explained, each takes from 50 to 80 hours to make.

Miss McInnes described St. Joseph's as a "pro-gressive school with a young faculty". "This is the way missing education will have to go to keep up with general education. Otherwise we won't be ready to receive students from schools using modern education techniques," she said.

Miss McInnes described independent learning as very important since the new two-year course had been brought in.

"We can't water down the curriculum, so we have to approach it in a different manner. If we can't make the student responsible in the classroom, we cannot expect her to be responsible when she is look-ing after patients," the teacher said.








Sister Rita Wiggins with Class of 1975
