TUITION FEES

A tuition fee in the amount of 1250.00 per year will be charged to each student. This fee will be collected yearly in two equal instalments per year - the first \$125.00 at the time of admission and the second \$125.00 in January of the same academic year.

EXPENSES PAYABLE ON REGISTRATION DAY



RESIDENCE ACCOMMODATION

Beginning in September, 1972, students living in residence will be charged at the following rate: SINGLE ROOM - \$60.00 per month - \$550.00 per school year DUBLE ROOM - \$50.00 per month - \$550.00 per school year PAYABLE - SEPTENPER 1st - 50% (for term Sept. 1st to January 31st) - FEBRUARY 1st - 50% (for term February 1st to July 31st) No refund will be made for room charges for incomplete terms. 

Board of Directors of St Joseph's School of Nursing An organization established to review policies and to oversee the management of the School of Nursing The board consists of 10 elected members and 7 appointed members to the Board, who are prominent *members of the community*

The board of directors is subdivided into 4 groups including Executive Committee, Personnel Committee, Finance Committee and the Educational Committee which included the 2 student members.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors of St. Joseph's School of Nursing, Hamilton, Ontario, is an organization established to review policies and to oversee the management of the School of Nursing. It consists of ten elected members and seven appointed members to the Board, who are prominent members of the community.

There are two student members who sit on the Board; a second year and a first year student. This year's first year student appointed to the Board was Ellen McKelvie. Each alternate year a student member is appointed to the Board. Marie Yakimoff was the faculty member appointed to the Board this year. The Board of Directors is subdivided into

four groups which meet independently throughout the year and then meet as a total Board at meetings held intermittently throughout the year. The sub groups of the Board include the Executive Committee, the Personnel Committee, the Finance Committee and the Educational Committee (of which the two student representatives are members). Such policies which are discussed at the Educat

admission policies, the Learning Resource Centre, which has been discussed at length these past two years in relation to the new programme established here in our school, and other pertinent business which arises throughout the year.

As Student members, both Ellen and I shared similar experiences at our first meeting of the Board. Personally it has helped me gain insight into the government about our school. This year has been exceedingly busy with the recent announcement from the Ministry of Colleges and Universities that the Nursing Schools throughout Ontario are to become affiliated with the Community Colleges. St. Joseph's is very special to me in very many ways, having seen the time and dedication that the number of interested people in our community have spent with the overall management of our school I can understand why St. Joseph's is very unique in its own way.

I'd like to extend my thanks to those who elected me to the Board and I hope that Ellen finds her experience of working on the Board of Directors a very intriguing one.



MISS HOPE

The crab - most people know what a crab looks like, but they don't know anything about it, and hence try to avoid any contact with it (to the point of not learning about it). Crabs are scavengers and are therefore considered unclean. They reside in shells cast off from other shellfish and, once they've outgrown that abode, move on to another one - not highly selective. Instead of moving forward or even backward as other creatures do, they inch sideways, resolutely, almost insiduously. It seems difficult to stop them - one can only alter their course towards an unknown destination. You can't even stop them by cutting off a limb - a new one grows back again.

It was this animal that inspired Hippocrates when he labelled cancer with the name that still causes dread and fear. The Roman Galen described this disease as an accumulation of "melancholy", or black bile. His word was accepted as complete truth for 1500 years. Thankfully science has advanced greatly since the Middle Ages and much has been learned about cancer. Unfortunately, however, the public and many professionals have not progressed as rapidly as research has. There is still great ignor-



ance, fear and superstition surrounding cancer. It is in this area that the nurse's role is so vital.

The nurse, both as a professional and a concerned citizen of the 20th century has an obligation to look at cancer – and learn as much as possible about it. Her role with a cancer patient is very complex – not only is she responsible for physical care and great emotional support, but also for educating the patient, his family and the people around him. We must dispel the myths about cancer, and replace them with facts. Not all the facts are pleasant but the public must be informed.


When I worked at Princess Margaret Hospital people kept asking me "How can you do volume work there? Don't you find it terribly depressing?" I cannot find that hospital depressing. I've seen so many people treated successfully. I've seen children run and laugh again and men and women go back to their families. I've seen hope and amazing results. Certainly there are deaths — many of them unnecessary because the person was ignorant of the facts or afraid to go to a doctor. This is the depressing aspect of cancer nursing — knowing that someone may die who wouldn't have to if he had sough early treatment and help. There may never be one single miraculous cure — we can't lead the public me expect that — cancer is too complex a disease. Treatment may be long, involved and painful — not always as easy as swallowing pills — but it is definitely treatment — successful and very worthwhile.

We in the 20th century equate treatment with cure. Treatment for cancer involves preventitive and palliative measures, as well as curative ones. It can be more important to an individual to be relieved of his pain than to be cured of the disease. It is often not death that people fear. Extension of life itself is an accomplishment that we often underrate.

To me it is fitting that Miss Hope is a student nurse — she represents energy, enthusiasm and a desire to learn. She doesn't pretend to have all knowledge — but she hasn't stopped trying to acquire the facts. We must stop running from the crab. We must clear away the misconceptions and look at what we can rightfully fear, in order to conquer this disease — "you can't fight a foe that you don't even know". Cancer CAN be beaten — it has, it is, and it will continue to be beaten if we all work together

Affiliation, not integration, urged for nursing schools

By JOAN HOLLOBON Schools of nursing must retain some independence when they are shifted to community colleges, otherwise their quality and traditions may suffer, the Ontario Hospital Association has told the Government.

The OHA suggested that the schools should be allowed to become affiliated with the colleges, rather than be totally integrated as a college department

Charles E. Boyd, OHA president wrote yesterday to the ministers of health and of colleges and universities seeking a meeting to discuss the matter. Before doing so, he obtained the support of many schools by telegram

The Government announced a week ago that after Sept. diploma nurses will be trained in community colleges

Mr. Boyd said that there is no quarrel with transferring the financing of the schools from health to education or with allying them more closely with educational settings. Mr.



We wish to inform you that a decision has been taken to transfer the responsibility for nursing education at the diploma level from the hospital and regional schools to the Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology. This decision is based on careful study, as well as recommendations made over the past few years by various commissions, professional associations and others involved in nursing education and health services delivery. A news release is enclosed.

The transfer will occur on September 1, 1973. The major portion of planning for the transfer will be the responsibility of local task forces. The composition of the task forces and their responsibilities are outlined in the accompanying document, Guidelines for the Transition of Nursing Education into the Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology.

You will also receive notification very soon of a regional meeting to be held in your area to assist you as necessary in commencing your planning. College area meetings are also planned.

At all times our major concern will be to preserve and where possible improve the quality of nursing education in Ontario, and that the public will continue to be served by the same kind of expertise and dedication that has always marked our nursing graduates. In addition, we wish to assure the administration, faculty and support personnel of the present Schools of Nursing that they should not be disadvantaged by the move.

This is a major undertaking of real consequence to the educational activity of our Colleges, and to the delivery of health services in Ontario. It will require the best efforts, goodwill and hard work of all concerned to make the transition a smooth one, and to ensure the continued effectiveness of our nursing education programs. We ask you to assist us in achieving this.





Sister Dorothy Goetz

Dorothy Anne was born on July 26, 1950, the second daughter of Martin Simon and Teresa Ida Goetz. She attended St. Louis School in Waterloo and completed her secondary education at St. Mary's High School, Kitchener.

Sister Dorothy attributes her religious vocation to her Catholic home life, family prayer, daily attendance at Eucharist and the example and influence of the SSNDs who taught her. In 1968 she entered the postulancy in Waterdown and studied Grade 13 subjects at Notre Dame Academy. She was received into the Novitiate in August, 1970. During her second year of novitiate she lived at Lamoreaux convent while studying nursing at St. Joseph's School of Nursing, Hamilton. She made her promises in 1972.

Upon graduation Sister Dorothy nursed at St. Joseph Hospital from 1973-1975. Then, she was in charge of the infirmary at Notre Dame Convent, Waterdown from 1975 - 1981 and 1984 - 1988.

While in Regina, Saskatchewan from 1981-1984 she assisted in pastoral care in Melville Hospital and was on the nursing staff at Pasqua Hospital. To extend her knowledge in health care, Sister Dorothy took several courses at universities and colleges and participated in SSND interprovincial conferences.

In 1990 she began her missionary work in La Paz, Bolivia. Here she was involved in pastoral ministry and health care. Before Sister Dorothy left La Paz in 1998 she had successfully supervised the water project which piped water to homes in the villages in San Miguel Parish.

On her return to Ontario, she was appointed Health Care Coordinator for sisters. Her loving, dedicated and professional care was appreciated by all whom she attended.

Sister Dorothy was an active participant in all SSND provincial and congregational affairs. She was coordinator of area assemblies and more recently a delegate for a dialogue group.

Sister Dorothy was a keen advocate for social justice. In 2005 she coinitiated the SSND Stop Human Trafficking Committee which has given numerous workshops to students and adult groups.

For a number of years she was a member of the RCIA team at St. Joseph Parish, Hamilton,


