A skit of true to life room-mate relationships was portrayed and remembered as well as Isolation Technique.


The party ended with the class songs of '66 and '67 and hearty cheers for the class of '68 with hopes for three good years.






In September 1965, a spiritual renewal began by a day of prayer spent at the Mother House of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

 Claribel studed at McGill and received her B.Sc.N. in Nursing and later went to achieve her Masters Degree in Public Health Nursing.

 Claribel was teaching nurses at the University of Nigeria.
- In 1996 Claribel wrote to Agnes, "please tell the Alumnae that I will always be grateful for the opportunity I was given!

 The nursing training was a terrific professional experience and it has had a tremendous impact on my life both professionally and personally".

Profile of an Alumnae Member

Cheryl McQueen (Gravelin'66) describes her professional career as "stimulating — chocked full of experiences and accomplishments". Upon graduation, she nursed in Hemodialysis under the ART-ful direction of Dr. Art Shimizu, and head nurse Marianne Stepanek. Their combined positive influence provided her with the essence of challenge, independence and self-confidence.

In early 1968, the call of the wild beckoned her to Canada's Arctic. She worked in two nursing stations: Tuktoyaktuk and Fort Franklin in conjunction with her position as Head Nurse of Paediatrics at Inuvik General Hospital, Inuvic, N.W.T. Three years later saw her in Europe, working for a short time in the Clinica Mediterranea, in Naples, Italy. She returned to Canada, worked at Solder's Memorial Hospital, Orillia, Hamilton Psychiatric Hospital, Hamilton, and McMaster University Medical Centre, ER, Hamilton. Shortly after meeting her husband, Nairn McQueen, a Chemical Engineer, they were transferred to Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. Always mindful of upgrading her nursing skills, she worked in ICU, CCU and ER both at Saskatoon City Hospital, and the University Hospital.

Upon return in 1986 to the Hamilton area, she worked at St. Joseph's Villa in Dundas, as a nurse and as Co-ordinator of Education. In September 1988, the Sisters of St. Joseph (Sister Ann Marshall's Council) approached her and asked if she would like to hear a pilot project to assess and determine the needs of the bereaved in the Hamilton area. Not one to turn down a challenge, she entered into this ministry whole-heartedly. The next seven years saw her develop bereavement programs in parishes, communities, funeral homes, federal penitentiaries and Indian Reserves throughout Canada.

It was during this time that she saw a need to upgrade her knowledge and skills. She enrolled in Theology at the University of Toronto, studied under Dr. Alan Wolfelt, Thanatologist at the Center for Loss and Life Transition in Colorado, and trained in Crisis Intervention for Schools and Colleges in Washington D.C. She received her Master of Arts in Ministry and Spirituality degree in November 1995.

In 1993, her contract with the Sisters of St. Joseph sadly had come to an end. She branched out on her own and established Bereavement Services Support & Education – a professional organization that provided grief counselling to the bereaved. Within a short period of time and with sixteen qualified facilitators on "staff", it soon became necessary to institute a Website: www.bereavement.net to help with the overwhelming demand for this service.

She has also established Coping with Grief and Loss, a weekly educational discussion series, for Cattel Eaton & Cambers Funeral Home in Dundas and for R.H.B. Anderson Funeral Home Ltd. In Hagersville, Fisherville and Oshweken.

Besides creating the manuals used in the bereavement groups, she has also authored four grief books. She lives in Dundas with her husband Nairn. They have two children, Mark 24 and David 22, both pursuing post-graduate studies.



Barbara graduated from St. Joseph's School of Nursing in May 1966. She has worked in the O.R. in Portage La Prairie, Manitoba, Halifax and St. Joseph's Hospital Hamilton, where she retired Dec 31st 2003.

She started out with Medical Group Ministry and Medical Ministry International in October 1994. Since then, she has participated in twenty one volunteer medical missions in eight different countries. November 2007, her last mission was to the Peruvian Amazon.

She has travelled to Ecuador, Guatemala, Haiti, Mexico, Honduras, Peru, Bolivia and India. These missions included: trauma, dentistry, orthopaedics, gynaecology, plastic surgery, ophthalmology, vaccinations and public health teaching. She has also been involved in a unique teaching program at the University Hospital in Port-au-Prince, Haiti.

On the left is a photo of Barb (with white head scarf) taken in India where she and a medical team participated in immunization programmes, sponsored by the Rotary Club International. Because this community interpreted this as a "Christian" mission, Barb and her team had to satisfy and dispel the suspicion of the Muslim families that they were there to heal and cure, not to destroy. As you can see by this photo, they succeeded in their guest in obtaining their trust.

She has also headed missions for and is currently on the Board of Directors of "Heart Links" A Canadian organization dedicated to the empowerment of women in the Zana Valley of Peru, - a London, Ontario based NGO "in solidarity with the people of Northern Peru". founded by the Sisters of St. Joseph. London.

In March 2008, she will be returning with MMI (Medical Ministry International) to Peru (for the eighth time) and in August 2008 to the Galapagos Islands to minister to the health needs of the poor people.

Her commitment to the healthcare problems in the developing countries include speaking to professional groups, clubs, regional and provincial conferences, hospitals (in service), churches and schools or to anyone who will listen. e.g. seniors residences. It also involves participation in third world projects and the collecting of medical supplies (crutches, wheelchairs, antibiotics, dressings, etc) and other supplies such as children's clothing, pencils and crayons. She is always trying to recruit others to participate, either as general helpers or as medical professionals. Anyone reading this is invited to participate in a project or to forward this on to someone who can. Seniors and teenagers are always welcome.

Nursing in the developing countries definitely has its challenges......unimagined and countless.....but the rewards are even more so. BASIC nursing skills, FLEXIBILTY, compassion, love of people, ingenuity, and a sense of humour are essential.

She sometimes travels by bus, sometimes by donkey or sometimes by foot. She has reached isolated communities in the Andes at high altitudes (13,000 ft) and has attended other communities at sea level. It is not uncommon for her and her team to be held up for hours by torrential rain and washed out roads. The insurmountable odds are her greatest challenges; the health and smiles of grateful people are her greatest investigations.

Her spare time is spent with family and friends. Her artistic talents include: watercolour painting, photography, (she is our Reunion Day Photographer for the Newsletter) and scrap booking. She lives in Burlington with her husband Jeff. They have five married children and nine grandchildren.

Barb spent most of her career in the O.R. at St Joseph's Hospital in Hamilton. She also worked at the portage la Prairie Hospital in Manitoba and the Halifax Infirmary, now the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Complex.

THE NURSING STUDENT OF THE 90'S - HOW THINGS HAVE CHANGED

4 Nursing education is as challenging today as it was for all of us, but in a different way. Since all of the hospital schools of nursing amalgamated under one roof at Mohawk College in 1973, there is no residence in which to live (and no curfews!). Therefore students live at home or in apartments and often travel from distant locations to start their 7:00 am shift at the hospital. Many get up as early as 4:30 am to drive in all types of weather, find a place to park, stash their coats in a locker and arrive in time for the tape recorded shift report. Students may wear their uniforms to and from work but not their shoes nor their security name badges. Uniforms are still blue and students choose their own styles as long as they conform to the dress code. White running shoes are usually the footwear of choice. Instructors no longer have to measure to ensure the correct length of dress but it is a challenge to ensure a professional appearance, given all of the earrings, nose rings and jewellery that are in fashion today. Gone are the caps, along with the distinction of a blue band to signify an intermediate and a black band for a senior. Now a student's level is identified by an arm badge, sewn (or more often pinned) to the left sleeve.

Many nursing students today are mature students, with husbands, small children and some previous college and/or university education. The majority hold down part-time jobs, often 14-21 hours per week and some even work full-time hours while attending school full-time. Do you remember when the first three men were accepted into nursing at St. Joseph's in 1964? Now 10% of our student population is male and these young men are a real credit to the profession. Do you remember how hard it was to learn all those new medical terms? Now instructors need to spend many hours with students for whom English is a second language, just learning the English words.

Students often move to new hospitals every seven weeks and must adapt to the different methods of charting use in each. Gone is the narrative form of charting and now a nursing diagnosis format must be used. Academically, students must purchase their course objectives and self-directed approach is used where they answer the objectives on their own before coming to class. Final exams occur every 7 weeks using multiple choice questions. Students are taught in small groups of 10-12 and must survive the same teacher in the classroom for half of the week who then accompanies the group to the hospital to apply the theory to practice for the other half of the week. Eight hour day and evening shifts are the norm until the last 14 weeks of the program when students begin 12 hour shifts.

As you can see, it still takes a special kind of person to be a nurse. If you are looking for a gift for that special person who is entering nursing, consider giving him or her a stethoscope, since hospitals no longer supply them for nurses to use. Better yet, let the student pick our their own - they cost from \$50 to \$75.

SHOULD WE ENCOURAGE PEOPLE TO ENTER NURSING? THE FUTURE OF NURSING IN CANADA

When a man or a woman chooses a professional career in the 90's, they will likely consider three factors. Will this career provide me with a job and a decent salary? Is this an occupation that is growing and will have a future? Is this a career that I will be good at and enjoy? To answer these questions, let us look at the nursing profession.

An employer today is seeking to hire someone with education, experience and a set of skills. There is no doubt that nursing provides an indepth, specialized education with many hours of applied experience throughout the three or four years of education. The graduate nurse also has an extensive set of skills that have been honed during these hospits and community experiences. For these reasons, we can definitely say yes to an employer and upon employment, the registered nurse can look forward to a full-time starting salary between \$35,000.00 - \$37,000.00.

Is nursing a growing profession and what does the future hold? It is predicted that Nursing will be ranked secon in the top ten occupational in this and the next decade. In fact, a shortage of nurses is looming by the year 2000. Why i this? The most critical factor is a decrease in the number of new graduates. A Canadian Nurses Association study, released in October 1997, revealed that "the number of RN graduates declined from a high of about 10,000 in the 1970's to 5.505 in 1994." In addition, 6,000 new graduates have gone to the U.S. since 1994. We also know that RN's are entering the profession at an older age and therefore shortening their potential years of service. 28% of new graduates are 31 years of age or older.

Another factor influencing the coming shortage or nurses is an aging nursing workforce. The majority of RN's were between 40 and 44 years of age in 1995 and this means that many are nearing the end of their working life and wil soon retire.

In addition, the highest users of health services are known to be the elderly and by 2011, the largest portion of t Canadian population will be 45 years of age or older. This means that demand for nursing services will grow by 46% between 1993 and 2011. In real numbers, "the extent of the shortage could vary from 59,000 to 113,000 by the year

Will I enjoy nursing and be good at it? What nurses do is timeless. They assist people through the toughest tria that life will ever produce with caring, compassion, education, problem solving and critical thinking skills. Perhaps we should advise people who are considering nursing, that you may have to adopt your passion TO nursing, rather than expecting it to fit your passion.

There is a definite future for nurses and nursing because nursing will always be the heart of healthcare.



NURSING EDUCATION IN THE 21ST CENTURY HOW THINGS ARE CHANGING

"When pollsters survey the general public as to what profession most inspires their confidence and respect, nurses invariably place at or very near the top. The public's admiration is something nursing can be very proud of, but it also gives the profession high expectations to live up to." (Nursing and You - A Newsletter for the Public from the College of Nurses, 2001.) How can nurses hold on to this status in the public mind? One of the keys is nursing education.

The history of St. Joseph's School of Nursing is a very proud one and reflected the many advances in nursing education over the years. From the 1930's when admission to a diploma nursing program required only Grade 9 education and programs were service oriented, the St. Joseph's program increased it's requirements to high school graduation with increased hours in the classroom. With the high demand for nurses in the late 1960's, the program changed to a two plus one year program, with the one final year being that of service and then to a 2 year diploma program. Then, with advances in technology, combined with a greater patient acuity demanding a more in-depth education, the 3 year diploma nursing program was re-instated. We must remember that this was 30 years ago and the challenges of health care delivery require an even higher degree of knowledge and expertise today.

In March 2000, the Ontario government legislated changes in nursing registration, requiring that all new nurses in the province have a university baccalaureate degree effective January 2005. Ontario is one of the last provinces in Canada to make this change. Therefore, in September 2001, Mohawk College will offer the last intake of their diploma nursing program, 2 ½ year stream only. This means completing the 3 year program in 2 ½ years. In addition, McMaster University, Mohawk College and Conestoga College are launching a unique, joint nursing degree program, starting September 2001, that will create the largest nursing degree program in Ontario. The four year program will be offered at all three institutions and graduates will earn a McMaster University BSc in Nursing. Total enrollment for the program will be more than 2,000 students by 2005. McMaster University will also continue to offer their 4 year degree program. Additionally, the one year Practical Nursing program (formerly RNA) will be expanded in 2002 to a 2 year diploma program at Mohawk College.

On June 1 2001, the day of the Alumni Annual Reunion Dinner, you are invited to come and experience the way nursing students are being educated today in a state-of-the-art facility, blending the art and science of nursing with innovative high technology. Mohawk College has extended an invitation to our alumni members to come for a guided tour of their new Health Sciences campus. The building, called the Mohawk-McMaster Institute for Applied Health Sciences, is located on the grounds of McMaster University, behind the former Teacher's College. Tours will be from 2:00-4:00 pm. and parking is free only when you identify yourself as a St. Joseph's School of Nursing alumnus.
