The first two students entered the school of nursing on September 8, 1911

The remainder of graduates entered at various times until a sufficient number was reached in order to have a graduation.

Graduation took place on January 22, 1915.

The ground was covered with a great white blanket. The impressive and elaborate ceremony took place at 8 pm in the lecture hall amidst prominent members of the Hamilton clergy, laity and medical professions who together with friends and relatives, enjoyed the musical programme prepared by the 9 young graduates.

A handsomely engraved medal, given for outstanding work, and huge bouquets of pink roses were presented to the nurses.

Following Graduation exercises the nurses returned to duty with their patients.

The birth of St. Joseph's School of Nursing Alumnae Association

The St. Joseph Hospital Alumnae was organized in 1915 under the convenorship of Misses Ada Egan and Jean Morin, assisted by Mother Helen Superior of the Hospital and Sister St. Basil Superintendent of Nurses.

After much planning and formulating of the constitutions and by-laws the nucleus of the present association was formed, with Miss Ella Kelly as president.

The Alumnae grew and progressed over the years always working hand in hand with the School of Nursing.

The graduates of the School form the body of the alumnae today.

Ella Kelly '15 was the 1st President of the Nurses Alumnae She was President from 1915 - 1933




Early records indicate Constance Annie Bullock and Gladys Wallace entered St Joseph's School of Nursing in 2015.

These textbooks contain signatures from these 2 nurses, indicating the year of graduation as 2018.





Undermount Classroom

*The nurses residence was called "Undermount" and was opened November 28, 1922 .
Student enrollment was 50 and the building could accommodate 100 students.
The school had an up-to-date teaching unit, libraries and reception room.
The building was erected at a cost of \$155,000.
The furnishings cost another \$18,000 for a total cost of \$173,000*

The building which is laid out in the form of an L and which is 206 feet long, is located on John Street South just south of the main buildings of St. Joseph's Hospital. Communication for the nurses and Sisters between the training school and the main hospital is afforded through a tunnel, well-lighted and heated which runs under the site of the proposed Mountain Roadway and which is 175 feet long.

LARGEST GRADUATING CLASS OF ST. JOSEPH'S

Thirty-Two Young Ladies Received Nursing Diplomas Yesterday; Miss Annette Egerton Wins First Prize for General Proficiency 1928

Dr. L. R. Hess, chairman of the medical staff, was the chairman yesterday afternoon at the graduation exercises of St. Joseph's hospital school of nursing, which took place at the nurses' residence, "Undermount." In welcoming those present Dr. Hess announced that it was the largest graduating class ever held, there being 32 graduates. However, the number of graduating nurses was still unequal to the demand, he said.

Mr. Vernon Carey's song, entitled "Mary," by Maude Valerie White, and Mrs. J. C. Brigger's vocal solo, "My Dear Soul," by Sanderson, were greatly enjoyed. Their vocal duet "At Dawning," by Cadman, was delightful.

VERY REV. DEAN CASSIDY
Right Rev. J. T. McNally, D.D., Bishop of Hamilton, made the presentation of diplomas and medals to the graduates. Very Rev. G. Cassidy was the first speaker of the afternoon. He congratulated the nurses upon having fulfilled so efficiently the time required in the training school, and also upon the occasion of receiving credentials which enabled them to enter the noble profession of nursing. It was an important day because it marked the termination of three years of hard work and study, and they naturally felt proud and happy. He stressed the importance of the nurse in a community. "You are starting on a new field of activities

THE BISHOP'S ADVICE

Bishop McNally stated that he was glad to be present to congratulate the class on such a happy occasion. There was not only very noble but also a very responsible position. There was a tinge of sadness to the graduation, for conditions demanded that their old associations be broken and that they go their separate ways. He advised the nurses to lighten the way of suffering souls with their smiles. "You must combine usefulness with sweetness and give both sympathy and help," he stated. Patients should have treatment for their souls as well as their bodies. They should be taught of the possibilities which lie beyond death, for their souls lived on. An important part of the nurse's duty was to recognize the value of the soul. She should be guided by the supernatural in life, he said. Thanksgiving should be indeliberately with everyone. He hoped that the graduates would go forth illumined by the continual sense of their responsibilities so that their lives would be a pledge for eternal life.

Memories top agenda at nurses' reunion

CALL IT an act of inquiring minds. About 50 years ago Norah Campbell and her classmates at St. Joseph's School of Nursing were penalized for trying to get to know a group of air force men.

The student nurses were living in one of the school's residences which faced the window of a building housing the young men. Their curiosity got the best of them when the women began peering in the window. It ended when they were caught waving at the men.

The punishment — loss of their Saturday night passes — seemed pretty stiff at the time, but looking back on the event at a meeting of the school's alumni last night brought plenty of laughter.

'Talked about fun things that happened ...and some of the sad'

"I was kind of waving," chuckled Mrs. Campbell, now 71, who reminisced with several former school chums.

The group was among 400 nurses who attended a dinner held by St. Joseph's School of Nursing Alumnae Association at the Hamilton Convention Centre.

Twelve of Mrs. Campbell's fellow graduates from the class of 1938, arrived from across Canada and the

U.S. to share some memories. Graduates ranged from the class of 1925 to 1974, which was the last graduating class before community colleges took over nursing training.

The reunion is an annual event. "It's been yak, yak, yak," said Mrs. Campbell of Owen Sound. "We've talked about some of the fun things that happened and some of the sad things."

Mrs. Campbell's memories of the school are fond ones. "It had good discipline and good training too," she said. "It was the best."

Lorna Matthews of Upper Wellington Street, a graduate of 1964, also has happy memories of her years as a student.

In fact, Mrs. Matthews has been

a familiar face at St. Joseph's Hospital since studying there.

After graduation, she spent one year at Hamilton General Hospital then took a few years off to have children. But by 1957, she returned to the hospital she fondly refers to as home.

Now she is head nurse in the kidney transplant and peritoneal dialysis units.

The passing years have brought a lot of changes at St. Joseph's, said Mrs. Matthews. The hospital is bigger and students don't live in residences anymore.

"But I guess that's progress," she added, before heading off to catch up on the news with old friends.


