There were 83 graduates in the class of 1970.


They were the 1<sup>st</sup> class of nursing interns to be graduated from the school.





It has been our experience that nursing students who lack sufficient mathematical knowledge and preparation have considerable difficulty with basic pharmacology, resulting in failures which have implications for withdrawal from the School. To ensure your proficiency in the area of mathematics, we are establishing this preliminary requisite and it is essential that the completed workbook is submitted as early as possible in August and by the 25th of August at the very latest.




ST. JOSEPH'S SCHOOL OF NURSING

REGISTRATION DAY

1. HEALTH  
If a student should be taken ill while at home, we ask that the Director of the School of Nursing be notified. When ill, in residence, the student will be given the appropriate nursing and/or medical care. There is a physician and a registered nurse who are in charge of the student health program. Specialists from the various fields of medicine are consulted without hesitation to render the best possible care for our students. Parents should encourage students to refer any medical problems to the health service at the School of Nursing or to the Director of the School. If parents are aware of any medical problems the student has, we ask that you discuss this with the Director of the School who is in a position to recommend suitable action.

Ontario Hospital Services Commission Insurance is maintained for all the students during the first two years in the School of Nursing. No treatment that has a serious implication will be given without parents' consent and they will be informed of the progress. Parents are responsible for payment of dental care. Sick time allowed is 14 days per year.

We assume payment of the Ontario Hospital Services Commission Insurance, and your son or daughter is automatically covered after the first three months of the first school year.

H.S. All students must be enrolled in a medical services insurance program, either as individual members or under their parents' policies, as the school will not be responsible for medical and/or surgical expenses. We ask that each student submit the Medical Insurance Policy and Group number on the day of Registration.

2. THIRD YEAR  
There is no allowance during the first two years. Students may apply for Government Student Loans, if necessary. Forms may be obtained through the Registrar.

At the time of writing, the student will receive an allowance of approximately \$250.00 per month in the 3rd year.

All third year students assume the payment of O.H.S.C. premiums, Canada Pension Fund, and Income Tax. It is the responsibility of the student to see that he or she is covered by a medical services insurance program, such as P.S.I. or some similar Medical Insurance plan.

3. LATE LEAVES  
During the Junior Term, the nursing students are to be in residence each night at 10.30 p.m. The students will be free each weekend while in class, from Friday night until Sunday at 10.30 p.m. All students are permitted 9 statutory holidays a year, and 4 weeks vacation. IT IS EMPHASIZED THAT FREE DAYS ARE FOR STUDY AS WELL AS FOR RECREATION.

A physician & a registered nurse in charge of student health program.  
Ontario Hospital Services Commission Insurance for all students during first 2 years in the school  
Parents responsible for payment of dental care  
Sick time allowed is 14 days per year  
Student must submit the Medical Insurance Policy & Group number on day of Registration
- #2 **Third Year:**  
Students will receive allowance of \$250 per month in the 3<sup>rd</sup> year.  
Students will pay O.H.S.C. premiums, Canada Pension Fund & Income Tax.
- #3 **Late Leaves:**  
During Junior Term, students will be in residence each night at 10:30 pm  
Students will be free each weekend while in class (Friday night until Sunday at 10:30 pm)  
Students are permitted 9 statutory holiday a year and 4 weeks vacation

5. ROOMMATE  
Students are informed of the name and address of her room-mate on Registration Day.  
In order to avoid confusion, we do not allow parents to the rooms on Registration Day unless assistance does not permit frequent visits. Students may take their parents to their rooms at any other time with permission from the Director of the school.

6. QUIETNESS  
If there are any questions regarding any of the requisites that you may not have been able to purchase, please ask us about them.  
In order to facilitate cleaning for the housekeeping staff, we ask you not to bring in any extra furniture such as T.V. tables, folding chairs, etc. As the rooms are small, such extra articles are just in the way and make it extremely difficult for the staff to dust, sweep, or vacuum your room.  
We do ask you to keep your cosmetic jars and bottles on a tray on your dresser for the same reasons as mentioned above.  
Roman Catholic students are asked to purchase Chapel Caps. These are available at the School of Nursing for .50¢.  
During the first two years students will not be wearing uniforms in class, but only during ward experience. Therefore the student should bring appropriate and practical attire for classroom wear.

7. Any student who does not fulfill requirements in theory, professional conduct and nursing skills will be asked to withdraw at the discretion of our Advisory Board.  
The student who fails an examination must prepare for and write a supplemental examination on payment of \$2.00 per examination.

8. NOTE:  
Students must submit their Secondary School Graduation Diploma at this time if they have not already done so. Please request the diploma or photostatic copy from your high school. Those students with Grade XIII Certificates must bring these also. These are necessary for our records and under regulations of the College of Nurses must be submitted within one week of Registration.

9. Please feel free to ask us any questions during your interview on Registration Day.

# Five presented with awards

**C**RISP white uniforms and bouquets of red roses. They are traditional for St. Joseph's School of Nursing graduates.

Tomorrow, all 83 graduates of the 1970 class, with the exception of Philip de Gelder, the only male in the class, will wear the traditional uniform to receive their diplomas at Fontbonne Hall. It will be the school's 56th graduation exercise.

But though they will look traditional, the 1970 graduates represent a new type of nursing student for St. Joseph's.

They are the first group of nursing interns to be graduated from the school. Following close on the heels of the pilot group that initiated the school's new 2 plus 1 program, which involves two years of education plus a third year set aside strictly for ward service, the 1970 class are the first students who actually lived outside the residence during their third year of training as nursing interns.

As interns, they collected a salary of about \$300 a month, instead of the traditional token allowance.

Also unlike the traditional nursing class, the 1970 graduating class has 16 married women among its members. Although the training program has changed drastically since the school's inception, there has been no change more welcomed by the students than the school's decision in 1965 to accept married women into training and allow students to marry before graduation.

Graduation '70 means more to the graduates than just collecting a diploma. The actual ceremony follows a busy two-week round of celebrating, which began April 23 with a graduation banquet at the Holiday Inn.

The banquet, for graduates and their parents and husbands, was followed by a wine and cheese party and tour of the nurses' residence.

On May 3, the Alumnae of St. Joseph's School of Nursing held a

The Red Rose Ball is an annual affair held by the intermediate and junior students for the graduating students. Each year the student body elects a Red Rose Queen on the basis of personality and nursing ability to be crowned at the ball. Last Friday, Jody Foster, 22, a married student, captured the title.

And when the tension of graduation is over tomorrow, the nurses will still have their graduation dance at the Burgundy Room in Fischer's Hotel to look forward to Friday.

The highlight of tomorrow's graduation ceremony will be the presentation of prizes and scholarships to five young women — Joyce Martin, Judith Parsons, Patricia Gilbert, Patricia O'Brien and Pauline Fenik. The girls did not know of their awards until today.

The prize for the highest academic standing, given in memory of the late Dr. Kenneth Murray, will be presented to Joyce Martin by Mrs. G. A. Lane.

Judith Parsons will accept the prize for general proficiency, given in memory of the late Dr. Orton James Newell, from Catherine Newell.

A bursary for post-graduate study in nursing education will go to Patricia Gilbert, a teacher on the St. Joseph's School of Nursing staff. Given by St. Joseph's Hospital Auxiliary, it will be presented by the president of the auxiliary, Mrs. J. J. Kelly.

Two nurses, Patricia O'Brien and Pauline Fenik, will receive bursaries, given by the medical staff of St. Joseph's Hospital, for post-graduate study in nursing administration. 





## 'Image-making' strong in TV politics

The "Mr. Nice Guy" of Canada in a television, Fred Davis, host of Front Page Challenge and Under Attack, last night took a few jabs at television's penchant for image-making.

Richard Nixon became president only after a full-scale advertising campaign drastically changed his on-screen image. Mr. Davis told some 400 people attending the fifth annual meeting of the Metropolitan Hamilton District Council, Canadian Cancer Society held at the Holiday Inn.

If it weren't for his seedy appearance and five o'clock shadow, Nixon might have won in the 1960 election against John Kennedy — in fact, he did come close, said Mr. Davis.

The American public wants a leader who is a combination father, coal mine man, pope and king, he explained.

Stressing that he was not anti-Nixon, Mr. Davis referred constantly to a book about the 1968 Nixon campaign, called *The Selling of a President*, written by Joe McGinniss.

This book explores the behind-the-scenes manipulating of a high-powered publicity staff which changed Nixon's image from a grumpy, cold, aloof man to a warm personality. The book was loaded with 18 commercials and 19 personal appearance shows which were provided with audience which would ask the right, prepared questions.

Through television, political candidates are judged acridly. "TV candidates aren't judged with their predecessors but with Johnny Carson. Style replaces and becomes substance," said Mr. Davis, who admitted his own "nice guy" image was built up considerably by the camera.


"How do the viewers know it's artificial. The man may be honorable, but how do we know it?" he asked.

He encouraged the public to cultivate "a healthy cynicism . . . Our only safeguard is our ability to interpret."

## St. Joseph's changes to two-year course

St. Joseph's School of Nursing is changing to a two-year nursing program.

Sister Maris Stella, director of the school, has received word from the Ontario Hospital Services Commission and the College of Nurses that the present Two-plus-One program will be phased out following the 1971 spring graduation.

Actually, the College of Nurses of Ontario, the approving body for schools of nursing, approved the two-year program for St. Joseph's in 1969. But the hospital had to await action by the OHSC.

In a two-year course, students graduate at the end of two years of nursing education. In the Two-plus-One, they require the two years' nursing education plus one year of nursing internship or a service year in a hospital.

Phasing out the Two-plus-One program means that St. Joseph's School of Nursing will have two graduations in 1971. In the spring, students who entered the school in the fall of 1968 will graduate in the Two-plus-One course, completing their year after graduation.

In the fall of 1971, students who entered in September, 1969, will become the graduates of the school's first two-year course.

The two-year course is in effect at the Hamilton and District School of Nursing and Hamilton Civic Hospitals

# Starched white uniform on way out

Male patients may say, "no way", traditionalists may skirt the issue but nurses in Hamilton and area hospitals are going "mod" about the pantsuit look in uniforms.

The uniform pantsuits, a complete breakaway from the traditional white uniform dress of nurses, are definitely "in" with St. Joseph's Hospital leading the fashion in the city.

Nurses there were given permission to wear them a couple of weeks ago on a trial basis, says Miss Margaret Peart, assistant director of nursing.

She says the "change is noticeable" and while the trial period will probably last for three to six months, it already appears "satisfactory."

Although nurses must wear their school of nursing brooches and identification badges, they do have a choice of wearing a colored pantsuit and a choice of wearing their caps.

## Culottes

Student nurses at St. Joseph's also are appearing in var-color these days. First-year students are wearing culottes in two colors, light blue and navy while second-year students have culottes in mint green and navy. Combined with these are brown shoes and stockings but no caps.

Teachers and students designed them and the students "just started wearing them" reports Sister Maria Stella, director of the school of nursing.

She says the colored culottes were originally intended for wearing out on community work, in homes and various institutions around the city. It hasn't been decided by the faculty whether the students will wear them on duty.

"It's certainly a breakaway from tradition but our motto is: 'It's what you are and not what you wear.'"

She says the children in the pediatrics ward love the colored uniforms the nurses wear and when nurses appear in white they ask: "When are their party dresses?"

nurses, particularly if the cap is missing.

Mrs. Lindsay feels pantsuits are far more modest for bending and reaching than mini uniforms are. She says the uniform would remain white and they would most likely keep the cap.

No request or policy has been made for pantsuits at Hamilton General Hospital according to Miss Margaret R. Charters, director of nursing.

"A nurse's uniform is a traditional thing for patients to count on," she says. Although she thinks pantsuits could look well on some nurses Miss Charters wonders if long trousers would attract dirt and bell bottoms be a safety hazard.

She doesn't anticipate any requests for a policy "because we haven't found it necessary to set any hard and fast rules. No one asked me whether they could wear a mini or midi either."

## Too short

Although most of the staff at the Hamilton Psychiatric Hospital wear street clothes some still wearing uniforms have started to wear pantsuits says Mrs. Graydon Smith, director of nursing.


Colored pantsuits would also be allowed, she says.

A policy is now being drawn up for nurses to wear pantsuits at Joseph Brant Hospital in Burlington, a spokesman said.

Although the spokesman thinks they are a fad, she also feels in some areas skirts are too short for working conditions.
